CHASING SMALLPOX FROM CHAPMAN PUPILS

City Health Officer Dr. Esther C. Post, aided by Deputy Health Officer Dr. E. Parker, are active in stamping out an epidemic of smallpox that has broken out in the vicinity of the Chapman school. All of the cases are of a very mild character, and none was reported by physicians attending the affected children. All of the physicians thought the cases were chickenpox. Other children were not treated by physicians at all, the parents thinking their children were suffering with some slight skin eruption. None of the cases was of sufficient importance to be sent to the hospital, although the homes in which the children live have been quarantined.

VEHICLE TAX CASE IS VITAL INVOLVES DECISION ON POWER TO VOTE ON THE MEASURE PASSED BY COUNCIL.

Whether or not the referendum can be invoked on a measure passed by the city council will be decided by President Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court tomorrow, when he will pass on the demurrer to the complaint in the case of George Long against the city of Portland. This is the case in which Long seeks to restrain the city from collecting the vehicle tax under a city ordinance until the ordinance has been submitted to a vote of the people. The decision is being awaited with much interest in city government circles, as this is the first time the question has been presented.

THREE YOUNG MEN WANTED FOR A BURGLARY FIVE YEARS AGO ARE BROUGHT TO BOOK BY DETECTIVES—SUSPECTED OF RECENT CRIME.

Detectives Coleman, Price and Hellyer this morning captured a trio whom they suspect of being implicated in a series of store robberies. They give their names as W. Shirley, Frank Bargar and Arthur Flood. None of them are over 24 years old.

ROBERTS IS THE CHARGE

They are believed to have committed the two robberies which occurred at the Moyer clothing store, Third and Oak streets, about five years ago, when on such occasion greenbacks on the clothing in the window, to the amount of about \$300, were taken. It is the belief that a total of burglaries have been committed in Portland by the trio. The three detectives have been on the trail of the band for several days.

ARGUMENTS IN MILWAUKEE CASE

Attorneys address court in rate hearing appealed from commission. (United Press Leased Wire.) Salem, Or., May 8.—Owing to the similarity in circumstances, the Lents rate cannot be taken as a criterion upon which to establish a fair rate from Milwaukee to Portland is the basis of Attorney F. T. Griffith's argument this afternoon before Judge Galloway, who is hearing the argument in the case of the citizens of Milwaukee and Oak Grove against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, who are asking for a five-cent fare in substitution for the 10-cent fare now in force. It is the same old argument, no disagreement. The railroad commission, after taking the evidence, ordered the 5-cent fare similar to that in the other company appealed to the courts and the decision will doubtless be reached by Judge Galloway in a few days. The evidence has all been taken and the argument of the attorneys is being heard.

SENATOR DENIES M'CUSKER'S STORY

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., May 8.—Senator Hemeway when shown an interview by Thomas McCusker in a Portland paper saying Hemeway told McCusker "If Bryan and Taft are nominated, Bryan would be elected. He would carry Indiana, whereas if Roosevelt was named against Bryan, Roosevelt would win Indiana by 100,000 and be elected," Hemeway said, "I never talked with Mr. McCusker and don't know what he said. I never expressed such an opinion and never held such an opinion. The whole statement is false as far as I am concerned."

MUST FACE A JURY FOR SHOOTING UNCLE

Donahue pronounced sane after examination by Dr. Johnson. An effort to have John Donahue declared insane and to avoid a trial by jury was defeated before Judge Cleland in the circuit court today. Donahue is charged with assault on his uncle, Edmund Sweeney. Donahue at the trial declared that he is sane, and as there was no proffer of evidence to have him declared insane his attorneys hoped to have him declared sane at the outset of the trial.
