

BOURNE SECURES A HAND-FREE DELEGATION

Those Opposed to the Senator and His Friends Declare the Meeting Last Night Was Packed—Stormy State Convention Is Now Inevitable.

After the adjournment of the love feast of the Multnomah delegation to the state convention held last night the convention hall was bathed and be-
 decorated with political gear, rhetori-
 cally speaking. The poor little dove
 of peace lost its olive branch early in
 the evening and at the close was left
 behind severely wounded and gasping for
 needed breath. Incidentally the Bourne
 warriors vanished into the night chort-
 ling with glee, for they had captured
 the meeting by a vote of 17 to 15 and
 bound the delegation to name for an
 unopposed journey to the state con-
 vention a week from yesterday.

The Fulton-Taft bunch, however, is
 breathing smoke and spitting blood and
 teeth over the battlefield. They will
 not be bound by 17 votes in a packed
 meeting, they contend when there are
 47 men who are entitled to a voice in
 the deliberations. The war will be
 carried into the state convention where
 it will be fought out to the finish and
 one thing is certain, Bourne and
 his friends will gain no concessions
 from any of the other factions.

Declare Meeting Packed.

It is openly asserted by the anti-
 Bourne men that the meeting last night
 was packed, and was called for the
 very purpose of forcing an unwelcome
 dose down the throats of the anti-
 Bourne men. This faction declares that
 it will choke before it swallows the
 dose.

Just as predicted in The Journal

Yesterday the Bourne people had the
 thing all framed up when the meeting
 of the delegation was called. The meet-
 ing was called under the guise of an
 innocently worded invitation issued
 by James Kerchem and manipulated by
 the Bourne leaders, which invitation
 gave as the object of the meeting an
 over-mastering acquiescence to the
 Bourne program. In the meantime, however, the Bourne
 leaders had lined up some 22 dele-
 gates who promised to be present at
 the meeting and stand in for the
 program. It was argued in framing the
 meeting that not all of the anti-Bourne
 men would be present and in this the
 argument was right.

After the meeting had been called
 the delegates proceeded to become bet-
 ter acquainted in much the same man-
 ner that two prize fighters get close
 together. During the day a preliminary
 had been framed up at the Bourne
 headquarters. It was brought to the
 evening meeting by A. W. Orton, who
 is the underdog of the anti-Bourne
 colleagues and coworker with John C.
 Young, who is in turn the prime min-
 ister of Senator Bourne. For reasons
 note Orton was instructed to turn
 the resolution over to C. V. Howard
 who was to spring it at the proper
 time.

Resolution Appears.

After a few preliminary punches the
 meeting warmed up and settled down.
 When harmony had been discussed for
 some little time and after it had been
 made plain that the chief aim of all
 was to cuddle up like the proverbial
 lion and the fabled lamb, then Mr.
 Howard lightly tossed his resolution
 into the arena. It read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Multnomah dele-
 gation to the Republican state conven-
 tion is unalterably opposed to any pol-
 icy that may be conceived which might
 and perpetuate internal strife and it
 characterizes as unwise such policy or
 any contemplated action which might
 create discord. Any attempt to instruct
 the delegates to the national conven-
 tion for or on behalf of any pre-
 ferred candidate, we believe to be a
 policy unwise, unjust, impolitic and in-
 harmonious, fraught with danger to our
 cause at home and detrimental to Ore-
 gon's best interests in congress, where
 many powerful leaders are serious candi-
 dates for the presidency. Therefore,
 be it further
 "Resolved, That we shall vote against
 an instructed delegation to the national
 convention from Oregon."
 To describe the particular brand or
 brands of harmony that were at once
 put on exhibition is beyond the real
 and reach of a newspaper vocabulary.
 In the words of "Happy" of the funny
 supplement, "It was sumpin' fierce."
 Everybody Takes a Hand.

Thomas McCusker, standard bearer
 of Bourne, waded into the battle in
 defense of the resolution. C. W. Hod-
 son, who had sought for and obtained
 a proxy in order to be near the har-
 mony fountain, waded out to meet Mr.
 McCusker. They waved their arms and
 through the shining lenses of their agi-
 tated glasses their eyes shot fire. W.
 E. Williamson, who is working hard to
 emulate the political triumphs of A.
 W. Orton, came manfully to the sup-
 port of McCusker, and both tried to
 drown Hodson out in a flood of ques-
 tions. But Hodson refused to drown,
 "Sit down! Sit down!" he cried and
 waded through the opposing argument.
 Everyone in the house took a whirl
 at the resolution but in the end it
 passed with 17 votes for it and 15
 against. As the meeting broke up S.
 C. Beach, who had gone down to de-
 feat with the rest of the anti-Bourne
 men, stopped the retreat and rearing
 himself aloft hurled this question in
 the teeth of the grinning followers of
 Bourne:

"Will the 17 delegates govern the
 other 30 members of the Multnomah
 delegation to the state convention?" he
 asked. No one answered and that is
 the question.

Undoubtedly the meeting of last night
 has fanned the smoldering blaze of
 contention into active fire. The issue
 is now clearly drawn between Bourne
 and anti-Bourne. Last night the Ful-
 ton men and the followers of Mulkey
 and Beach lined up against the Bourne
 faction. It is apparent, therefore, that
 while there may be a private differ-
 ence between the two Taft factions
 the Bourne bugaboo will drive them
 into common cause. It is a certainty,
 however, that there will be a most de-
 cided scrap when the state conven-
 tion meets.

Only a handful greeted the speaker at the courthouse. An invitation was given the city council, which was in session, to adjourn and attend the meeting, but the city fathers considered municipal affairs of more importance than Mr. Cake's speech, and declined.

The meeting was one of the poorest and coldest held here for some time. Mr. Cake disappointed many of those who did attend, in that he had nothing to say about Statement No. 1. RUSH FOR IDAHO'S RECLAIMED TRACTS

 Caldwell, Ida., May 8.—The general manager of the San Francisco, Idaho & Montana railroad has just received a stock of elegant advertising material for this section. The folder is of the finest paper and has colored illustrations of the country tributary to the road. The issue will cost about \$2,200.

The contractors, who have begun work on the railroad, have full forces employed. The road to the Snake river will be finished about June 1. The bridge across the river will be begun as soon as the high water subsides and will be rushed.

Many new people from points east of here are coming to the country, drawn here by the climatic conditions and the prospect of water on the vast federal redemption tract, which will receive water next fall. Dry land along the new road and in the section under the government tract has been selling of late at prices formerly commanded by irrigated land alone and not enough can be had at those figures to satisfy the many who are coming here to find new homes.
