

# ATTEMPT TO ROB HEINZE

### Copper King Has Attorney Arrested, Accusing Him of Trying to Extort \$40,000 From Him by Threatening Exposures.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
New York, May 8.—Charged with trying to extort \$40,000 from F. August Heinze, the former copper king, Edwin G. Brennan, an attorney of Butte, Montana, was arrested yesterday afternoon and placed in a cell in the tomba.  
In accordance with an arrangement previously made, detectives were concealed in Heinze's office when the latter is said to have given the lawyer three notes for \$40,000. Brennan was very indignant over his arrest. He insisted that his claim for the money was legitimate.  
Heinze explained later that Cashier Clements, of the Aetna bank, of Butte, in which he is interested, was arrested recently for the alleged falsifying of accounts. The only witness against Clements was a girl stenographer whom he married. Brennan was Clements' attorney. Heinze said that after the case had been disposed of Brennan wrote to him saying that he knew that the banking law had been violated by him in the case of the Aetna bank and that unless Heinze produced \$40,000 Clements and his wife would testify against him. Brennan said this afternoon that he has no fear of the outcome. He was anxious to furnish \$10,000 bail. Brennan said two of his aunts recently died in Rochester, New York, leaving him and his father \$125,000. He said he pointed out, he was not in need of money.

Indianapolis, May 8.—Edwin G. Brennan is the son of Edward J. Brennan, a prominent physician of this city. Young Brennan is very well known socially in Indianapolis. He married a society girl, but has been divorced from her.

### EUGENE HAS SIGNED WATERWORKS EXPERTS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Eugene, Or., May 8.—The city council yesterday entered into a contract with F. C. Kelsey, a Portland civil engineer, and McArthur & McClain of this city for the construction of the municipal water system, with the source of supply from Ritchie creek and several other creeks 22 miles up the McKenzie river.  
The contract was signed yesterday afternoon, and the engineers started out today to make the preliminary survey of the creeks to ascertain the amount of water to be obtained. Ritchie creek will be the main source of supply, and the other creeks will be drawn on only in case the water in Ritchie creek becomes inadequate to meet the demands.  
McArthur & McClain are to do the actual construction work, and Kelsey is to be the consulting engineer, he to have entire supervision of the work and to furnish all plans and specifications. He is to receive as pay for his services a sum equal to 1 per cent of the actual cost of the construction of the water system. McArthur & McClain are to receive a like sum.  
The contract is, of course, conditional upon the sale of the \$300,000 bonds recently voted by the people of the city.

## THE PLAY

Wilton Lackaye seems at last to have rendered an inestimable service to the English-speaking stage—that of effectually drumming Hall Caine out of the tolerance of theatre-goers. "The Bondman" does the work. I can't conceive of anyone who has seen "The Bondman" wasting any more time with Mr. Caine and his Manx heroes, his Scripture-quoting old nincompoops, his sulphur mines and his highly colored sacrifices.  
It would be entertaining to let Mr. Lackaye himself tell what he thinks of the plot as it has been presented for a season that reaches far and wide. An essay by W. L. on himself as Jason should make excellent reading far ahead of anything he is able to furnish at the Hellig this week. Every family should make a habit of reading the grandpa, toothless and full of awful jokes. Grandpa deserves lynching here as the customary Caine children, introduced without the shadow of an excuse—there merely to add to the Caine realism, as in the third act he fills the house with absurd figures who will miss the fact that it's a real mine the brothers are working in. And there's the young Manxman who goes forth to seek his fortune, and, of course, becomes president of Sicily.  
The tricks rather pulled upon the Hellig audience. They, of course, took certain delight in seeing what means Jason takes of working out his story—the plot was as absurd as that of the simplest-minded person there, but the fate of the bondman was not hard to imagine. The eyes of several managers of cheap houses fairly gleamed when the third act, with the sulphur mines, the red fire, the awful strength, the gleaming lights, the ore, the armed guards and, best of all, the final explosion and cataclysm of noise, was pulled off. What a piece of work! Jason St. George Daggen would make! I trust that if he has the opportunity St. George will go and see Mr. Lackaye. It probably has been added anything to his reputation by playing "The Bondman" here. The stage pictures, throughout, appearing first in sailor's garb that is not becoming, later in a confusion of colorful rickety clothes, black flowing tie and puttees, and still later in cloaks and plumes. Mr. Lackaye is not that kind of actor. He isn't romantic. The boast of his press agents has always been that you would never take him for an artistic person. Nor would you in the part of Jason.

His leading woman, Miss Elsie Ferguson, playing the part of Grebe, is pretty and simple, and is at times quite charming. Her profile is pure, and her voice for the most part is pretty. There is a truly astonishing array of other characters—the islands of Sicily and Man have apparently been depopulated to furnish the stage. The exits do fairly well. The stage pictures, on the whole, are pretty, and the settings are rather elaborate. As this is positively the last opportunity to see Hall Caine in a first-class theatre, the opportunity should not be missed. "The Bondman" will play the remainder of the week.
