SOON SPEAK IN VALLEY TOWNS

Governor's Itinerary in the Willamette Valley Has Been Arranged.

Governor George E. Chamberlain, who is now in eastern Oregon campaigning in the interest of his candidacy for United States senator, is swinging back towards the Willamette valley after a most enthusiastic reception by the people at all those places where he has spoken. From the reception which has been tendered the governor and from the promises of support which he is

receiving as he continues his tour it is evident at first glance that he is much stronger throughout eastern Oregon than he was during the campaign for the governorship two years ago. On every hand support is being pledged to him because of his strong stand in favor of Statehood No. 1 and his advocacy of the principle that the people of the state should be the arbiters of their own government. Governor Chamberlain will make his first appearance in Portland on the night of May 28. His appearance here will mark the practical close of the campaign, though he will speak at Seaside on the afternoon of May 29 and at Astoria at night. The Astoria speech will be the last of the campaign.

The itinerary which has been mapped out for the governor during the remainder of his campaign is as follows: May 11—Morrow county, Condon, at night. May 12—Gilliam county, Condon, at night. May 13—Wasco county, The Dalles, afternoon; Hood River, night. May 14—Washington county, Forest Grove, night. May 15—Yamhill county, Sherwood, afternoon; Newberg, Yamhill county, at night. May 16—Medford, afternoon; Ashland, night. May 17—Josephine county, Grants Pass, at night. May 18—Douglas county, Roseburg, night. May 19—Lane county, afternoon, Cottage Grove, night. May 20—Clatsop county, afternoon, Canby, night; Oregon City, afternoon. May 21—Marion county, afternoon, Woodburn, night; Salem, night. May 22—Linn county, afternoon, Lebanon, night; Albany, night. May 23—Benton county, Corvallis, at night. May 24—Polk county, Independence, afternoon; Dallas, at night. May 25—Multnomah county, Hillsboro, afternoon; Portland, at night. May 26—Clatsop county, afternoon, Seaside, at night.

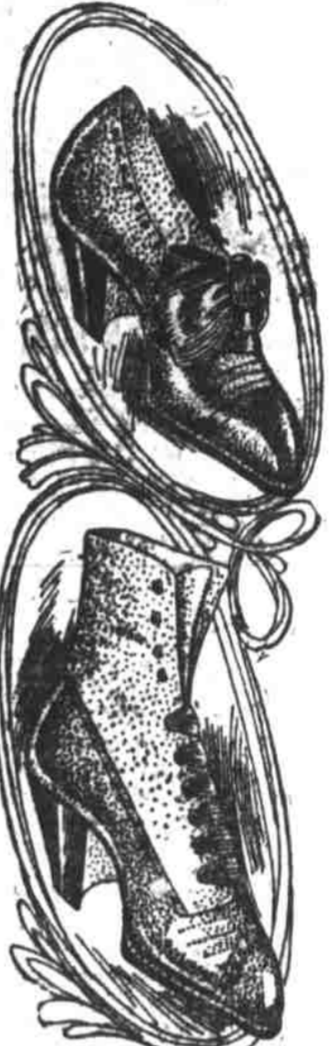

Judge O'Day, to whom the case had been assigned, waited for the attorneys to confer, and they soon announced that an agreement had been reached. Wilson was hurt by falling from a car at the junction of Nineteenth, Chapman and Morrison streets, December 12. He claimed that the company was negligent in allowing the car to become crowded, he being shoved from the car by the crowd as he was standing on the lower step. He asked for \$250 for internal injuries, doctor bill and the loss of his overcoat in the mud.
