### "HURRY UP," THE CITY CRIES TO THE ROSES

Fear Expressed That the Prides of Portland Will Not Be in Full Beauty for Rose Festival—Some Say Season Is Favorable, However.  
Will the roses bloom in time for the Rose Festival the first week of June? That is the question that is worrying every owner of a rosebush in Portland, and that means every one that has a square foot of ground.  
There is a difference of opinion among the florists of the city. Some think the season later than usual; others think conditions are normal, but all agree in saying that time only can show whether or not the roses will be here by the first of June. Warm weather is what is needed and warm weather we will have, say many of the rose culturists.  
The general opinion is that the roses are in finer condition this year than ever before; that there will be an abundance of them and that they will be beautifully developed. Whether they will be in full blossom for the festival is still a matter of question. A week or 10 days will probably decide that matter.  
Mr. Clarke of Clarke Brothers, florists, thinks the condition of the roses for the festival is not yet decided. "It is a bit uncertain," he said. "The supply may be sufficient if the weather turns out all right. I am inclined to think they have set the date a week too early. Last year it was too late for the best roses, but this year I am back so much that they will not be blooming in quantities. However, if there is plenty of sunshine from now on, and less cloud weather the roses may be up."  
A Burkhardt, another florist, is a little more hopeful of the rose outlook. "I think they will be in time," he said. "They almost always are in full bloom by the first of June. This year they are a little backward on account of the weather, but they are in good condition and I think there will be plenty."  
"All right," says Fossett. "They will be just in time. This weather is favorable to roses and we still have three weeks before the festival. Yes, I believe they will be out just in time, and will be in their first and best bloom. They will be more plentiful than ever from present indications, and with three or four days of sunshine we'll have roses to throw away."  
Mr. Forbes of Martin & Forbes said that this weather is favorable for the roses.  
"If we have a few hot days after the 20th we can look for the very best results. This cool weather is the kind we need for developing the growth of the roses. They will be in splendid condition, ready for the final ripening if this keeps on a little longer. However, they will have to hurry a little for this year they seem to be a little later than usual. There will be plenty if we get them at all, for the buds are abundant. A few climbing roses have already blossomed. Last year the roses bloomed very heavily for Decoration day. The first of the week it looked as if they were to be scarce, but the warm weather brought them out in abundance. This year it is hard to say how they will be."  
William Sibson who has spent his life in rose culture and owns the Sibson rose nurseries on the east side is not very sanguine in his hopes though says a hot May might bring the roses around.  
"The season is pretty late," he said, "and unless we have a very warm May they will be too late for the festival. Mere sunny days will not be enough; they must be warm. Even now with the roses can't be in full swing by June first."

### JOHN F. CAREY NAMED CHAIRMAN

Socialists' National Convention Will Be Presided Over by Massachusetts Man.  
Chicago, May 11—John F. Carey of Massachusetts, was this morning elected chairman of the Socialist's national convention. Indications today are that the convention will nominate its candidate for president on Thursday and will finally adjourn on the following day.  
Guy Miller of Telluride, Colo., will today extend the convention the greetings of Ernest Miller, secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, which congratulates the Socialists on their splendid battle.

### WANTS MONEY BACK FOR MAIL ORDER STOCK

Annie K. Larsen Declares Greenfield's Company Misled Her.  
Alleging that she was deceived by alluring promises of money she would make if she would invest in stock of the Pacific Mail Order company, Annie K. Larsen is seeking to recover \$1,360 from October 12, 1907. Her suit against the company and J. R. Greenfield, its president, went to trial before a jury in Judge Chisland's department of the circuit court this morning.  
The plaintiff asserts that she was misled by a promise to guarantee 5 per cent interest, being informed that her profit might run up to 50 or even 100 per cent, and that the investment was better than a government bond and safer than a bank. She charges that the company's representations are fraudulent and that she paid the money she paid for 15 shares, with the minimum interest that she says was guaranteed.
