

POPULAR ELECTIONS TO BE HELD IN SEVEN STATES

Twenty-Seven States Desire U. S. Senators Named by the People.

C., May 12.—That 27 states have declared in favor of popular election of federal senators—Arkansas, Iowa, Texas, California, Nevada, Missouri, Nebraska, Louisiana, Kansas, Wisconsin, Michigan, Tennessee, South Dakota, Utah, Kentucky, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Wyoming, North Carolina, Illinois, Colorado and Oklahoma—and that of the 19 remaining two thirds are ready to do so, is the substance of the article five of the federal constitution is not subject to a time limit, are the remarkable facts which Senator Owen's amendment sets forth in a memorial filed with the senate here from Governor Haskell of his state.

CONGRESS ADJOURNS WEEK FROM FRIDAY

Senate Passes Agricultural Appropriation and Other Important Measures.

(United Press Lined Wire.) Washington, May 12.—At a conference yesterday between the leaders of the house and senate it was practically agreed that congress shall adjourn Friday, May 22. The senate yesterday passed the agricultural bill carrying an appropriation aggregating \$12,142,146. For building roads and making other permanent improvements the federal government will expend \$1,900,000, instead of \$500,000, as provided by the house of representatives, was appropriated, giving one half the amount asked by the chief fosterer.

Pullman, Wash., May 12.—In a quarrel over a trifling matter relative to a native land, Frank Guillery, an Italian, shot his brother yesterday in Staley five miles south of Pullman, on the Bismarck (Idaho) branch of the Northern Pacific railway, where both were employed as section hands. Frank fired three shots. One took effect in the chest, and the other two ranged down from the shoulder through the lungs, which is considered a fatal wound. The wounded man was brought to Pullman and sent to Missoula, Montana, to the company hospital. Frank immediately made his escape. WASHINGTON INSANE ASYLUM STATISTICS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, May 12.—April broke the record in the two insane asylums of this state in admission of new patients. In the eastern Washington hospital 23 were admitted, the highest number in any single month. The institution is so crowded that the superintendent reports he will have to fit up temporary sleeping quarters for the additional twenty-two deaths an unusually large number, occurred at the latter institution.
