The body of Thomas Brady, the old pioneer of Portland, who died in Tacoma Saturday, was brought to this city Sunday afternoon. The funeral was held from St. Mary's Catholic church on the east side this morning, burial being in Tigardville cemetery.

The case of Annie K. Larsen against the Pacific Mail Order company and J. R. Greenfield, its president, called for trial before Judge Cleland in the circuit court yesterday, ended in an indecisive skirmish. Owing to the filing of a writ of habeas corpus, the trial was allowed for an answer and the plaintiff took a voluntary nonsuit so far as Greenfield is concerned.

WAKE UP EARLY. CLOSING SPORT. Consumer's League Committee Is Taking Matter Up With Unions.

The committee which was to report to the federation acting with the Consumers' league in endeavoring to close the retail stores at 6 o'clock Saturday night, reported last night that the heads of the principal firms of the city had been visited and that the general opinion was that the merchants would not close if the majority will do so. Some said, "if all will close," others, "if a majority will close," and still others, "if a reasonable number will close," but the prevailing opinion is the same.

The committee recommended that some other day than Monday night be chosen for the Saturday night closing, as it is thought that this will have an effect on the Saturday night closing. The recommendation was also made that the committee obtain what legislation can be obtained either by a local law or a state law affecting all first class cities, and that the closing of stores on Saturday night.

The labor unions are now working among their own members to secure a cessation of Saturday night closing. "Almost without exception," said one of the committee, "the merchants whom we visited laid the responsibility of the Saturday night closing on the laboring people. They say that the sales Saturday night are almost entirely cash sales. They make a good case, but they are not the only ones who are not working people who shop at some other time the Saturday night closing will become a necessity."

A plan is suggested to create public sentiment by holding mass meetings. A meeting will be held Monday night in the Lutheran chapel to hear what progress has been made. The following resolutions were passed: 1. That steps be taken to secure the enactment of a state law to apply to cities of the first class, making it compulsory for business houses to close at 6 o'clock on Saturdays. Your committee has designated its male members a sub-committee to investigate the legal and constitutional status of such a measure.

2. That letters be written to each labor union in the city, urging the necessity of abstention from shopping after 5 p. m., especially on Saturday, and that systematic agitation be at once begun by this organization among all the people for the same purpose. 3. That all employers in the city who make a practice of paying off their employees on Saturday be requested to make Monday or Tuesday the weekly payday.

4. That steps be taken to arrange meetings with the employees in the mercantile establishments with the view of getting them to take united action in their own behalf and to help promote the objects of this organization. 5. That this committee be authorized to add to its membership at its discretion.

DRY ORNANCE RECOMMENDED STOP WHISTLES AND CURB THE HAWKERS

License Committee Listens to the Complaints of Business Men. Members of the license committee of the city council finally voted on the hawkers' ordinance which not only doubles the amount of license fees for these men but also prevents the horrible screeching of the monotonous whistles on the peanut wagons.

Several of the attorneys protested that the ordinance would be prohibitive but the councilmen had petitions from business men asking the ordinance be placed on the hawkers. The business men placed their contentions on the ground that they pay high rates and are unable to compete with the hawkers who make a practice of standing directly in front of stores and under the awnings.
