

VALUE OF CARGO BREAKS RECORDS

Steamer Will Carry Lumber to Copenhagen and Hamburg.

PORTLAND FIRM GETS BIG ORDER

More Tonnage Headed for Portland to Load Lumber for Foreign Ports Than Ever Before in History of the City.

The most valuable lumber cargo ever shipped from Portland will be set afloat during the latter part of next month on a foreign tramp steamer for Hamburg and Copenhagen. It will consist of nearly 4,000,000 feet of decking, flooring and masts, valued at an average of \$3 per 1,000 feet. This will bring the total value of the cargo to about \$12,000,000.

The cargo will be shipped by the L. P. Lee Lumber company and has already been contracted for with mills in this city and along the Columbia. The steamer has also been secured but the name has not yet been announced, the owners being undecided as to which one of their fleet now in Pacific waters will be best available by the first of the month.

Two other steamers have been fixed during the past few days to load lumber here for foreign ports so that there are now an even 10 large tramp steamers listed to arrive here within the next two months. The two named this week are the British steamers Craighall and Earl of Carrick, of 2,887 and 2,650 tons net register. Besides these the steamers Allantown, Forerick, Guernsey, Strathgilly, Inverkip, Yeddo and Tabor are on the export list. The combined net tonnage of these carriers is 27,000 tons, and their capacity is estimated at close to 40,000,000 feet of lumber.

With most of these steamers arriving about the same time there will be busy scenes along the various mill wharves, as the work of loading is usually done with the greatest possible dispatch. It being customary to have lumber carriers under time charter.

The five-masted schooner Henry K. Hall is also due to arrive here soon to load a cargo of lumber for Kobe, Japan. She will carry about 1,500,000 feet.

There are two tramp steamers in the harbor loading lumber at present, the Norwegian steamer Hornsien for Panama and the British steamer Strategyle for Shanghai. The Strategyle is expected to complete her cargo by the first of next week. The British bark Kelburn is loading lumber at the Tongue Point lumber company for Europe.

cleared today for Durban, South Africa, with 113,853 bushels of wheat, valued at \$161,852. This is the first cargo of wheat shipped from here for the dark continent for some time.

The German bark Nornia left down this morning bound for Europe, with a cargo of wheat. J. W. Matthes, representing M. C. Harrison & Co. at this port, has been appointed consignee here for the Netherlands. His territory includes Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

SAILOR HAD SMALLPOX.

Oriental Liner Alesia Passed Quarantine at Japanese Port. Because of having a Chinese sailor on board afflicted with smallpox, the Portland & Asiatic liner Alesia was detained in quarantine at Japan, the Chinaman was taken ashore, the ship was thoroughly fumigated and everybody on board was vaccinated, including Captain Ernest and the officers.

The steamer brings a clean bill of health and hence had no trouble getting through the quarantine regulations at the port. The smallpox epidemic is concerned in the orient, both Hongkong and Japan, and it is not the very best of omens to see the effect that it has been wiped out. The Chinaman on the Alesia had the disease in a very mild form, and it is supposed to have been an isolated case.

The Alesia arrived at Montgomery dock No. 1 about 7 o'clock last night after one of the smartest voyages ever made between Yokohama and Portland. It took her 16 days of sailing although from date of departure to date of arrival it figures only 15, one day having been lost in crossing the meridian. She has made the run in 15 days and 19 hours, however, so her last performance is not the very best.

The bulk of the cargo consists of gunnies, there being 2,018 bales consigned to Portland importers. The duties on these will amount to about \$35,000. The overland freight consists of 1,600 rolls matting, 450 sacks soya, 240 sheets tea and 13 cases curio. The Portland consignments made from 2,018 bales of gunnies, consists of 15,399 sacks of rice, 100 sacks of tapioca, 100 sacks of pepper, 100 sacks sugar, 100 sacks tin, 500 sacks soya, 1,300 bags peanuts and 418 packages curio.

The Alesia stopped at Newchwang on her way out from Portland last voyage and delivered 1,000 tons of flour. The ice was just breaking up when the Alesia arrived and she was the first steamer to reach the harbor for the winter. She left there April 27, having had to wait outside one day to get enough water to enable her to cross the bar to Pechili gulf, the ordinary stage water there being only about 16 feet.

Returning the Alesia ran into a strong current five days before reaching the Columbia river, or she would have made the run about six hours quicker.

OFF TO MEET THE FLEET.

Roanoke, Alliance and Nome City to Carry Excursions.

The North Pacific Steamship company will send the steamer Roanoke from Portland to meet the warship fleet off the mouth of the Columbia river, and P. P. Baumgartner will send the steamer Alliance and Nome City to sea from Astoria.

It is understood that the fleet will arrive at the mouth of the Columbia river lightship on May 20, a week today, and if such proves the case the Roanoke will leave here Tuesday evening as to be at the mouth of the river when the fleet puts in its appearance. The Alliance and Nome City will be held at Astoria and leave from there when word of the fleet's approach is received from some point down the coast.

The Roanoke has secured permission to carry 700 passengers for the trip and the Alliance and Nome City will also be given special permits for larger crowds than they carry on their regular runs.

The Alliance will be in the harbor this evening, but the excursion scheme will not interfere with her departure Saturday night for Coos bay. The Nome City is due to arrive in the river from French cove about Monday, so she will come in just in time for the excursion business. The Roanoke is due to reach here Tuesday morning from San Pedro and way ports and her cargo will be rushed out so that she can leave down in the evening.

OFFICERS FAIL TO EXPLAIN MAN'S DEATH

(United Press Leased Wire.) Fort Bragg, Cal., May 13.—Casper, a small town near here has a mystery that grew out of the death of Fred Steinhardt, a wealthy resident. Steinhardt was found dead two days ago at the foot of the inside stairs of his home. The first theory was that he had fallen down the stairs and met death in that way. A coroner's jury tried to solve the mystery, but failed. The next theory was to return an open verdict. Jesse L. Peacock, his wife and three-year-old child reside at Steinhardt's home. One report was that Steinhardt had insulted Mrs. Peacock and that his husband had attacked him. The Peacocks have been questioned by the police authorities, but they are unable to throw any light on the mystery.

OFFICERS FAIL TO FIND THUGS

Seattle, Wash., May 13.—With scores of officers searching and running down all clues, the two bandits who held up and robbed the Great Northern express car yesterday morning have eluded capture and the police today are absolutely at sea regarding their whereabouts. Pinkertons and special agents of the Great Northern are in the same quandary as the local officers. The dragnet, which has been out since noon yesterday, has failed up to this time in bringing in a suspect. The reward of \$2,500 has served as a special incentive but has failed to attract any attention. The officers from the surrounding districts have joined in the search. Perrine, the messenger, is resting easier today and to the officers gave a detailed account of the holdup. The only thing that promised to furnish a clue was the arrest late last night of a former brakeman of the Great Northern who was discharged the first of the month. This morning he was arrested but gave a good account of himself and was released. A peculiar incident was that when the brakeman confronted Perrine in the hospital the latter said that he looked like one of the men that held him up. Perrine then stated that both bandits were young, possibly about 23 and 24 years of age.
