

DOGS ON TRIAL
Slayer of Charles Simms
Faces Jury in Circuit
Court at Enterprise.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Enterprise, Or., May 14.—The May term of the circuit court convened here last Monday, Judge Crawford presiding. The first case called for trial was of the state against James Dorris, who is charged with murder in the first degree. It is the second trial of the case. In 1906 Dorris was convicted for manslaughter and was sentenced to the penitentiary for 10 years, but upon appeal to the supreme court the case was reversed and remanded for trial. In 1906, on Losone, in the county, Dorris had an altercation with Charles Simms, an insurance agent, and just after Simms had struck Dorris down on the face, Dorris immediately shot him and Simms died. Some of the witnesses who were present at the first trial have moved out of the county. It may be impossible to have them present at the trial. Judge Bennett of The Dalles is defending Dorris, assisted by J. A. Burleigh of this place. The state is represented by District Attorney Ivanhoe and the assistant district attorney, J. P. Rusk. The trial will take up the entire week.

UNITED STATES IS

LEBANON'S NATIONAL
BANK TO OPEN SOON

PROHIBITIONISTS LOSE
FIGHT IN ASTORIA

Judge McBride Upholds the
County Court in Refusal
to Call Election.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Astoria, Or., May 14.—A motion to quash the writ of mandamus issued from the circuit court some days ago, directing the county court to declare an election on local option in Astoria, precincts 2 and 3, was presented to Judge McBride at St. Helens this afternoon. A telegram was received late this afternoon from J. A. Babin, who is the attorney for the defendant, as follows: "Judge McBride quashed the writ of mandamus and sustained the action of the county court. Signers have the right to withdraw from a petition."
This means there will be no election on local option in precincts 2 and 3 on June 1 and that the county court was justified in its action in permitting certain of the signers of the petitions in those precincts to withdraw their names from the petitions, even though those withdrawals were sufficient to render the petitions insufficient to render the writ of mandamus. OLDEST SOLDIER IS
ON LECTURE TOUR

When he was still in his teens he enlisted in Uncle Sam's army and fought in the war against the Mohawks and Sacs in the volunteer service. After the war department learned recently that he was the oldest living soldier he was granted a pension. Clark traveled around the world preaching temperance while General Grant was president of the United States. He is now devoting all his time in delivering lectures to young men.
