

CAMERA FIEND ENDS ROMANCE

Eloping Couple Decide to Return Home When Confronted by Him.

 San Francisco, May 15.—What was to have been an elopement, with Harry Norman Child of Spokane, Washington, and Miss Gladys Cummings, daughter of a local sculptor both attending the University of California, as the principals, was rudely interfered with by the camera of a newspaper photographer after the license had been secured and a ring had been purchased.
 Child, 23 years old, the son of a banker and a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, had secured the consent of Miss Cummings, who is 15 years old, and a member of the Omega Nu society, to an elopement. They have known each other for a year.
 Early Friday morning they quietly made their way to San Rafael. The couple reached the courthouse steps about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Child inquired his way to the county clerk's office, followed by the blushing bride-to-be. After the clerk had expressed some doubt as to the age of the couple he was finally persuaded to give them a license. Child tucked the piece of paper into one of his inside pockets and dashed away to a jewelry store, where the wedding ring was bought. They were unconcerned, however, of the fact that a newspaper photographer, who had guessed the object of their visit in San Rafael, was watching their movements. After the ring had been purchased he approached Child, introduced himself and asked for permission to take a picture. The young man grasped, while Miss Cummings pleaded with the photographer not to say anything about the incident.
 Child rushed back to the county clerk's office and canceled the license and later threw the ring into the bay. Miss Cummings returned to her home at 3708 Union street and sobbed the rest of the day and part of the night.

WATERPIPE MAY BE DROPPED ON EAST SIDE

Because the Harriman system refuses to transfer freight with the Northern Pacific company in the Harriman yards on the east side, the water board is in a quandary as what to do with 1,000 tons of cast iron pipe which will soon be due from Chicago. The pipe is to be used on the east side, but unless the companies come to some agreement allowing an exchange of freight, the pipe, which will come to Portland over the

Northern Pacific, will have to be unloaded in the terminal yards.

Superintendent Dodge stated that the proposition was a new one recently inaugurated by the companies, and asked for instructions from the members. Mayor Lane instructed Dodge to write to the Chicago firm which has the contract for the pipe, telling the company that it must put down the pipe on the east side.

COMMISSION ORDERS DEPOT AT GASTON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Salem, Or., May 15.—An order was made by the railroad commission yes-

terday directing the Southern Pacific to build and maintain a freight and passenger depot at Gaston of adequate size and with conveniences to suit the traffic handled at that point. A hearing was held at Gaston two weeks ago and the order is the result of the findings at that hearing.

Gaston is in Washington county, seven miles south of Forest Grove, and is a regular station on the west side branch of the Southern Pacific. An agent has been maintained there for some time and all west side trains stop there, but no accommodations have been maintained for passengers or for the reception and delivery of freight. According to the findings of the railroad commission the service at Gaston has been inadequate and unreasonable. The commission has ordered that a depot be built that shall be 15 feet and

2 inches in width and 60 feet in length. It shall have a floor space of approximately 210 square feet and shall be equipped for the accommodation of passengers. This order must be complete within 45 days from the time the order is served.
