LITTLE CRIPPLED GIRL NURSES FRIEND DESPITE QUARANTINE

One is 11 years of age and the other 12. They are little girls—one confined with chickenpox and the other hobbling around on crutches with a broken leg in a plaster cast. They live in squallid little rooms on Davis street. When Health Officer Dr. Baither C. Pohl called to examine the little girl suffering with chickenpox she heard a thumping on the bare floor and turned around to find a starved little face with great brown eyes pleadingly raised. As the owner rested herself on her crutches and said: "Please, Mrs. Doctor, don't take her to the pesthouse. I will stay and nurse her. I've had chickenpox and smallpox and I will stay with her all night and all day. I live across the way but my mother will let me stay and I know just what to do. I will rub the ointment on her and she will nurse. I know how to do it. She is my only friend and I am here. I will stay with her and will make her well. Please don't send her to the pesthouse."

And the great brown eyes pleaded and pleaded as the poor little thing hobbled about on her crutches, while she told how she had stayed with her little friends thus far, washing dishes, sweeping the floor and nursing the sick friend while the father and mother of the afflicted one were out making a bare living that the rent for the little room might be paid. "Yes, she is my friend," murmured the sick one in her little folding bed as Dr. Pohl leaned over to examine her. "She will stay with me and help care me while papa is away. He cannot come home now until I am well, so some one must stay with me. Her mama does not care and she is my only friend. "You see we play together all the time and she loves me and I love her. She stays with me and will stay with me and never leave the house until I am real well. Please let her stay with me." And then the one on crutches—the one with the great wide-open brown eyes, said:
