Members of the water board slammed the communication from the city council requesting the board to purchase fire hydrants, for which \$42,000 was appropriated at the beginning of the year, upon the table at its meeting yesterday, and agreed to stand pat on its resolution not to consider the fire hydrants a part of the water department system.

Superintendent Dodge reported that there are 150 hydrants on hand that have not been installed. This announcement was followed up by a request from Chief Campbell asking the water board to have the hydrants installed by employees of the water department, because the work could be done cheaper than if employed by the fire department are used. This he said, would be possible, because the water department can secure laborers to do the work at a lower salary than the fire department.
