

ROYALTY ANGRY AND VERY MUDDY

Prince and Princess of Wales
Forced to Wade Through
Mire to Visit Fair.

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.)
London, May 15.—The Princess of Wales' little effort to conceal her anger over the opening of the Franco-British exhibition did not succeed. Owing to the incompleteness of the grounds she had to walk in mud to her shoe tops, while the pitiless rain drenched her gown. The princess looked very unroyal and very bedraggled. She gave the Prince of Wales a piece of her mind and the prince scowled and refused to deliver the long speech he had prepared. Instead he opened the show with a single sentence:
"I pronounce this exhibition now open."

Later the prince explained his indignation at the Duke of Argyll, who was a director of the exhibition. The duke had written a long ode and while the angry prince suppressed his speech the duke's ode, set to music, was played to a pitiless finish, despite the rain and distress of the sodden prince and princess and their unhappy courtiers.

It was reported later that the Duke of Argyll after the ceremonies told the Princess of Wales that he thought the day's mismanagement. The duke and Kirafty had a heated argument and it was stated that the duke struck Kirafty.

IMPORTED HUNTSMEN WILL BE DEPORTED

Government Orders Two of Radnor
Club's English Employes
Sent Home.

Philadelphia, May 15.—Taking the stand that Charles Allen and Robert Curfe, two Englishmen, were brought to the United States to work for the Radnor Hunt club in violation of the alien labor law, Secretary of Commerce and Labor Straus has issued orders for their deportation.

The men were induced to come to this country by William Davis, chief huntsman of the club, himself an Englishman. Allen was to be second kennelmen and Curfe whip to the pack of English hounds used in fox hunting. The attention of the department of commerce and labor was drawn to the fact, and at a hearing in Washington it was ruled that the men were contract laborers within the meaning of the statute regulating the employment of aliens.

A delegation of club members waited on Secretary Straus last week to show that the importation of the men was done in good faith and on the part of Davis, and not to any intention of violating the law.

LOVED HIM ONCE, SHE 85; HE, 18, IS JAILED

Feeble Old Woman Charges Former
Sweetheart With Steal-
ing \$225.

New York, May 15.—Through the arrangement in a Brooklyn police court today of Paul Sharp, a middle-aged man of 18, a shattering romance of an old and a young person was revealed. Sharp was charged with having robbed Mrs. Catherine Bohanan of \$225. She said she had told her story on the witness stand, the young man was held for the grand jury.

Mrs. Bohanan, who coyly admitted that she was "past 85 years old," had to be assisted to the witness stand. "I loved him once," she sighed, in conclusion, "but I do not care for him any more."

Sharp put in a general denial of the woman's story, but the magistrate considered it so weak he held him for the grand jury without bail.

London's Last Private Garden.
