(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, May 16.—Several thousand Methodist churchmen, mostly delegates to the general conference, cheered President Roosevelt in his speech at the anti-race suicide policy as expressed in his speech at the American university, today.

# WHY STINGY STATE VANDERBILT

### Outsiders Wonder Why Appropriation Should Be in Danger From Voters.

Portland, Or., May 16.—To the Editor of the Journal—The problems in state government which the coming election present for our solution are receiving attention elsewhere than in Oregon. The traveler has only to listen to "smoke-room" talk to learn the attention we are attracting. No long since while on a train between Portland and Eugene I overheard a conversation between two Washington men, each of whom had purchased a small farm in Oregon to be devoted to the fruit industry—one I remember near Canby.

Each was loud in his praises of Oregon and her resources. Each was familiar with her historic memories, when asked, "What has got into you Oregon people? You have a great state—a country of wonderful resources. Oregon has well earned her title of 'The other of Washington and Idaho,' and yet I observe that your coming election is fraught with some danger to your educational interests, because even the niggardly appropriation of \$125,000 a year for your university, amounting to the meager sum of seven cents for every 650,000 people, may be in danger."

What could I say except to assure my new-found friend that the people of the great state of Oregon would never permit the referendum system of government we have entered upon to present any educational problem. I was keeping pace with our material growth. True, I was obliged to admit that the appropriation of \$125,000 for the university had not been paid for their last quarter's services for the year 1935. That the legislature was not forthcoming in its appropriation; that the board of regents of the university, consisting of such names as DeLong, M. A. Miller, N. L. Butler, Judge Ben, Judge William Smith, Judge J. W. Hamilton, Frederick H. H. Friendly had recommended the appropriation, but I valiantly fought for the good name of my state.
