

THAW WANTS FOR VERDICT

Attorneys for Millionaire Satisfied That They Have Proven Their Client Sane and That He Will Be Released From Madhouse.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 16.—The question of Harry Thaw's release or return to Matteawan insane asylum, was submitted to Supreme Justice Morschauer tonight. Both sides will file briefs but no more testimony is to be taken. Thaw's lawyers say they are satisfied they have proved their client sane.

District Attorney Jerome is also thoroughly convinced that they have proved sane and he will not recommend as he intended, to Pittsburg, London, Paris, Rome and Monte Carlo for testimony in support of his claim that Stanford White a slayer should remain in a madhouse.

Thaw took the witness stand in his own behalf at 3 o'clock tonight but answered only one question before his counsel interposed, went into consultation with Jerome, and shortly agreed with him to submit the case on the testimony already before the court. It was just after Deputy Clerk Edward M. Estlinman of Dutchess county has testified to conversations with Thaw every day during his stay in the jail here and to his opinion that the latter's talk was rational, that Jerome called the young Pittsburg to the stand, Attorney Graham, for Thaw, objecting saying the time was not the proper one for his client's examination, Thaw nodded to him, however, and Graham withdrew his objection.

Asks Court for Advice. Thaw looked cool and collected as he faced the prosecutor, but he understood the nature of the proceedings. The justice explained that the habeas corpus proceedings raise the question whether he is sane and that it is for the court to render the decision on the strength of the evidence submitted.

Then the witness looked back at Jerome, who inquired if the former knows Dr. Flint, the alienist. "Would you be willing," queried Jerome, "to submit to an examination by Dr. Flint and others of my experts?" Attorney Graham instantly interrupted and the court sustained him. Jerome said he believed Thaw, who is in court fighting for his liberty, should be willing to submit.

The justice suggested a conference between Thaw and his counsel to decide whether to accept the prosecutor's proposal. Attorney Graham agreed and a 30-minute recess was taken. At its conclusion, Jerome was brought

BELL RINGERS OF SEVILLE.



One of the most wonderful spectacles in the world is presented whenever the great bells of the Giralda, the cathedral of Seville, Spain, are rung.

These bells are high within the 350-foot belfry and so large that when they swing their sides protrude far out beyond the belfry's walls. When ringing the bells, the men who pull the ropes, which set them swinging, are dragged up to a great height from the flooring and some even perch upon the tops of the bells to give them a greater momentum.

People come from distant places to witness the ringing of these bells. And now and then are horrified by the sight of one or other of the ringers being dashed to death.

Justice Morschauer directed that briefs be submitted to him at White Plains, where he will be holding court next week. He added that he would render a decision by a week from Monday.

Thaw showed considerable nervousness while the colloquy between his attorney and the court was in progress. He doesn't appear to be worried, however, and he readily consented when a photographer requested permission to take a candid picture. Thaw laughed heartily when the explosion occurred.

Until the justice's decision is rendered Thaw will remain a prisoner here.

Thaw's three alienists, Doctors Pilgrim, Jelliffe and New, who are the principal witnesses at the early sessions of court. Dr. Pilgrim, superintendent of the Hudson River state asylum for the insane, former president of the state lunatic commission, told Jerome he had received \$1,000 for testifying, but was emphatic in his declaration that he believes Thaw sane. He saw Thaw in a piece of linen that was dirty and has been washed clean. Asked whether he did not think Thaw sane when he killed White, Evans replied that two years ago he had discharged 400 patients, cured, since then.

Dr. Jelliffe agreed with his brother alienists. Forensic Commissioner Tompkins testified that they often talked with Thaw and saw no signs of insanity.

CONGRESS HAS BROKE RECORD

The Appropriations Exceed Those of Previous Session by \$300,000,000.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, May 16.—The present session of congress, to end next week, is a record breaker. The appropriations of this session so far authorized exceed those of the first session of the 59th congress by more than \$300,000,000. The total appropriations made up to this time aggregate approximately \$1,434,497,000. This amount will be increased by the general deficiency and omnibus public buildings bills and such other measures as may go through before adjournment.

The session has also established a high record for the number of bills, resolutions introduced and considered and for the transaction of executive business. There have been introduced in the senate 21,949 in the house. In the senate 30 joint resolutions were offered, of which 30 were passed and nine have become laws.

The senate considered 184 simple resolutions. Up to this time 115 bills and 15 joint resolutions have become laws. The senate has passed 484 bills, 17 of which were omnibus pension bills. It is estimated that these measures represented more than 2,000 individual claims, and the saving in printing and handling them approximated \$1,000.

The executive business done by the senate this session is almost three times greater than was handled during any previous session. Up to this time 34 resolutions have been ratified and made public.

Practically the whole day in the senate was spent in consideration of the bill for the forest reserves in the Appalachian and White mountains. It was finally passed, after a speech of nearly two hours by Senator Teller of Colorado in opposition. It carries an appropriation of \$5,000,000, and its chances of passing the house at this session are poor.

As a first move to redeem the Republican promise of revising the tariff, the senate adopted a resolution authorizing the finance committee to take up the subject of tariff rates and to employ such agents to collect data to assist in the revision of the schedules. The committee is also to report as to legislation, reciprocity or otherwise, necessary to enact in order to secure equitable treatment for American products abroad. The committee will sit during the summer.

The first step by the house toward a revision of the tariff was taken this afternoon, when the resolution to authorize the ways and means committee to sit during the recess of congress and employ agents to collect data to be used in the preparation of a bill revising the tariff, was adopted.

Republican floor leader, Payne, said: "We will first elect a Republican congress. We will have the whole committee after the election to consider the tariff bill. That tariff will be a maximum and minimum tariff, putting us on an equality with France, Germany and Russia and it will be a Republican tariff designed to continue our prosperity."

Payne said that the financial depression demanded that business be given a rest.

MAKING READY FOR CONVENTION

Chicago Sub-Committee Postpones Selection of Chairman.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, May 16.—The real work in preparation for the Republican national convention began today when headquarters were opened in the Coliseum. Chairman New, Secretary Elmer Dwyer and the sub-committee on arrangements inspected the new quarters and took possession.

The sub-committee on arrangements has postponed the selection of a temporary chairman until next week. While Senator Doolittle of Iowa is the favorite for the honor, friends of Senator Albert Beveridge of Indiana, are bringing strong pressure to bear for him.

The political prophets predict the selection of John R. Malloy of Ohio, as temporary secretary.

Dr. Evans, commissioner of health, has arranged to locate an emergency hospital in the west end of the convention building and a corps of physicians will be on hand during the convention.
