

FIRST ACCIDENT TO BE RECORDED

Supervising Inspector Birmingham Says Regulation Works Well.

RULES ARE STRICT BUT EFFECTIVE

Chief from San Francisco Will Accompany Local Inspectors Edwards and Fuller to Astoria to Inspect Several Vessels.

Supervising Inspector John Birmingham arrived here this morning from San Francisco to remain through the four days on his semi-annual tour of inspection.

Inspector Birmingham says every boat going out over the bar will be limited to a safe number of passengers and an ample number of officials will be on hand when the boats pull out to enforce the temporary regulations.

From here the supervising inspector goes to Puget Sound to arrange for the enforcement of the temporary rules when the fleet arrives.

COASTING STEAMER ARRIVES.

Rose City Brings Record Breaking List of Passengers.

With 396 passengers on board, the Harriman liner Rose City, Captain Kidston will reach Astoria from San Francisco this afternoon.

A large number of the passengers are sightseers returning from the Bay City after having seen the warship fleet.

The North Pacific Steamship company's steamer Roanoke, Captain Dunlop, which was scheduled to arrive here tomorrow from San Pedro and way ports, will be in Portland Wednesday.

The steamer Nome City, Captain Hanss, which is also scheduled to carry excursionists to see the fleet, will be at Couch street dock this evening to deliver 400 tons of general freight from San Francisco.

The lightship will be known as No. 92 and will be under the supervision of the district with headquarters in Portland, Oregon.

TRAMP STEAMER DEPARTS.

Strathgyle Leaves for Shanghai After Waiting for Firemen.

The large British tramp steamer Strathgyle left down at 8 o'clock this morning bound for Shanghai with a cargo of lumber.

It was impossible to leave without them because the immigration officials insisted that the firemen could not remain here and so the big liner was compelled to lie at her dock burning.

At 4 o'clock this morning the missing firemen showed up and steps were immediately taken to prevent them causing another delay.
