

# EXPECT TO END STRIKE

### Rioting at Cleveland Continued Today but Police Are Getting the Situation Well in Hand—Carmen Stoned by Unionists.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Cleveland, Ohio, May 19.—Rioting today continued to mark the progress of the streetcar strike, though the end of the trouble seems to be in sight.  
In many instances cars and the crews that man them were stoned, but the police were so quickly on the scene that serious disorders did not result. In one part of the city a streetcar collided with an explosive which had been placed on the track and was badly damaged, but no one was injured.  
It is hoped and expected that peace will grow out of a conference being held today between members of the state board of arbitration, union officials and officials of the municipal traction company.

# SAKE CLASSED AS "STILL WINE"

### Judge Who Has Never Tasted Liquor Decides Delicate Point.

San Francisco, May 19.—In all probability an appeal will be taken to the United States supreme court from the decision of the United States district court of appeals handed down Monday, in which it is held that sake, the national drink of Japan, which is brewed from rice and is imported to this country in large quantities, is a "still wine" and therefore dutiable as such, and not as a "beer." The decision involves more than \$2,000,000 paid into the United States treasury under protest and increases the duty from 40 cents per gallon in bottles to \$1.50 per gallon and from 20 per cent to 50 per cent in bulk.  
In its opinion the court says:  
"We think there is a similitude in use between sake and still wine, both being drunk for purposes of exhilaration and both are capable of producing intoxication, although intoxication from sake passes off more quickly than that produced by wine."  
Judge De Haven, who has never tasted intoxicating liquor, wrote the decision.

# DODGE THE CHARTER TO BUY DECORATIONS

### City Council Plans an Ordinance That Will Carry \$500 Appropriation.

That the ordinance appropriating \$500 for decorations on the east side during the Rose Festival is illegal is contended because the charter does not provide for appropriations of this kind. For this reason a new ordinance will be introduced at the special meeting of the council tomorrow afternoon which will appropriate \$500 for street cleaning purposes and which is expected to be spent for the decorations.  
This is clearly an evasion of the law, and whether it will be approved by Mayor Lane is another question. Inasmuch as Mayor Lane's particular hobby is clean streets for Portland, it is possible that he may sign the measure and see that it is used for cleaning streets and not for decorating them for the Rose Festival.  
Another feature of the ordinance passed by the council appropriating \$500 for street decorations is that it authorizes the mayor and auditor to turn the money over to a private individual. This is also considered an infraction of the law, because there is a street cleaning department with a recognized head and if the money is appropriated it will have to be spent under the direction of the superintendent of this department.

# TROOPS SUPPRESS RIOTERS AT HANKOW

### (United Press Leased Wire.) Tokio, May 19.—The rioting at Hankow, which began 10 days ago, has been suppressed. The damage to property inflicted by the rioters amounts to \$50,000. Many persons were killed or wounded.

# ATTACKS TEDDY FIRST SPEECH

### First Senator Elected by Direct Vote of People Advocates Bryanism.

Washington, May 19.—Senator Taylor of Tennessee delivered his maiden speech in the United States senate today, and his colleagues declare it was a great argument bristling with facts. Many of the Republicans regarded it as an unwarranted attack on President Roosevelt and their party.  
"In these important days," he began, "when concentrated wealth is intruded upon the dome of the capitol and centralized power enthroned in the White House, what can be expected but a gradual encroachment of the federal government upon the reserved rights of the states?  
"How an equilibrium be preserved under the reign of the 'big stick' and a bag of gold? I cannot understand the consistency of trusting trusts over the head and at the same time fighting for the tariff, which is the mother of trusts. It wouldn't reflect upon the ability of this nation; I would praise him for the noble things he has done, chief of which was the turning of the lime-light upon the enormity of the crime committed by his party. The question is, are you going to put the president's reform policies in a strait jacket, or are you, why don't you endorse Bryan and be done with it? If you are not, you will repudiate your president."

# BELLE GUNNESS BORN IN NORWAY

### Bryndhild Poulsdatter Was Maiden Name of La Porte Murderess.

Trondhjem, Norway, May 19.—Bryndhild Poulsdatter was the maiden name of Mrs. Belle Gunness, whose "murder farm" at La Porte, Indiana, in America, is now the center of an investigation to probe the mystery surrounding the death of her 14 alleged victims.  
According to a report made by the authorities of Selbe, a village in Norway, the woman was born there on November 11, 1859. The village records show she left her home 20 years ago and went to America. Her only surviving relative in Selbe was a sister, who died last Friday. It is said that the two sisters had not heard from each other for several years. The police here are convinced that Mrs. Belle Gunness did not return to Norway.  
La Porte, Indiana, May 19.—One of the alleged victims of Mrs. Belle Gunness has been positively identified that Coroner Mack today issued a certificate and ordered the corpse turned over to relatives.  
This action was taken in the case of Jennie Olson, whose body was one of the first found on the "murder farm." When inquiries were made as to her sudden disappearance Mrs. Gunness repeatedly told the story that the Olson girl had gone to Los Angeles.

# STUBBORN DEBTOR PAYS AND GOES FREE

Champaign, Ill., May 18.—After holding out for several months, Professor Sherman Cass, the Tolono, Illinois, high school principal, imprisoned in the county jail here, capitulated, paid \$700 to Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Burke and was released.  
Cass was committed to the debtor's cell October 9, 1907, when he refused to pay a judgment of \$1,800 secured by the Burkes for assisting in the punishment of their son, a pupil, who is declared to have received permanent injuries at the hands of the teachers.  
Miss Annie Kelly, a teacher, performed the major part of the punishment, but she escaped a deputy sheriff with a warrant and fled west only returning to seek exemption from judgment by trying to prove bankruptcy in the federal court. She is out on bond, therefore, until this question is settled, and is teaching in Tolono again.  
To leave the cell of 10 by 3 feet dimensions, where he has remained all winter and spring despite the kindly offer to give him the liberty of the penitentiary, Cass was obliged to guarantee to pay the rest of the judgment if Miss Kelly would not. He may be recommitted if the money is not paid.  
He was locked up under the debtor law in quasi-criminal cases, and had sufficient funds to pay the judgment, but refused, insisting he had done no wrong. Weekly his fees have paid \$2.15 for his board. He was obliged to pay the balance of the judgment.  
Both Miss Kelly and Professor Cass will be tried for assault and battery at the circuit court this month, and indictment returned against them.  
"I'll go to jail before I pay," Miss Kelly has reiterated, and she may still refuse to pay the balance of the judgment. She was admitted to a bad boy and a said to have called Miss Kelly vile names.
