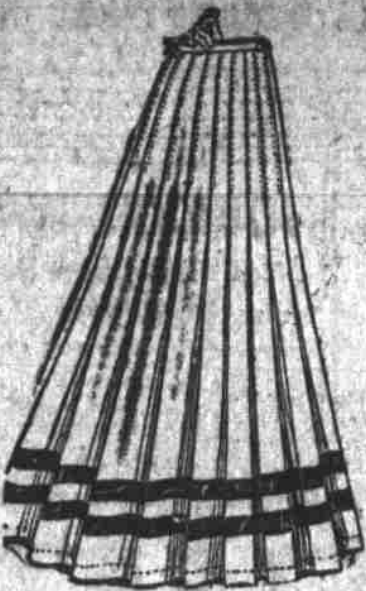

## LILLEY IS SCORED BY COMMITTEE

### Congressman Called Instrument of Lake Submarine Company and Accused of Having Acted in Bad Faith With House.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
 Washington, May 20.—Branding all of his charges as being false, and accusing him of bad faith, contempt and disregard of his obligation as a member of congress, the select house committee appointed to investigate the accusations made by Representative Lilley against the Electric Boat company of using corrupt methods to influence legislation in its favor, made its report to the house today. The report is a scathing denunciation of the part played by the Connecticut congressman in the controversy and a complete vindication of

the boat company and Congressman Loud.  
 Representative Lilley is arraigned for allowing himself to be used as an "instrument of the Lake Submarine company," and is charged with "acting in bad faith," "violating his obligation as a member," and "acting in contempt of the house."

The committee finds that the introduction of the resolution asking for an investigation of his charges was not introduced in good faith by Lilley, that he had no information to justify his charges, that he acted in bad faith in making them, and that in stating that he made no charges reflecting upon members of the house he was not sincere. The report further charges him with violating his obligation in formulating and urging before the committee groundless charges against Congressman Loud of Michigan, that he acted in bad faith when he allowed his clerk to send letters reflecting on the honor and integrity of members of the house, and that he acted in contempt for not disclosing the letter published over his own signature reflecting on the honor and integrity of members of the house.

By destroying a forged letter from his secretary to Frank L. Edinborough of Bay City, Michigan, relative to the Loud incident, Lilley is also held to have acted in contempt.  
**Assisting Lake Company.**  
 The committee finds that Lilley's object in making the charges was to bring a "propaganda" in behalf of the Lake company, which sought to defeat the clause in the naval appropriation bill favoring the electric company. Lilley's charges that excessive profits were being made in submarine contracts are declared to be based on fictitious figures, and that Lilley knew the charges to be false when he made them.  
 The committee finds that no press correspondent, naval official, member of congress or campaign committee had been corrupted by the electric company, and Lilley is accused for refusing to testify at the beginning of the investigation without the aid of counsel. Continuing the report says:  
 "His request that he be allowed to dictate the selection of counsel and the mode of procedure of the committee was not only extraordinary but unprecedented. Though Mr. Lilley asserted that he

did not know Mr. Neff of the Lake company, it was subsequently proved that they were intimate friends. Mr. Neff had been holding daily conferences with Mr. Lilley, beginning with the night of the introduction of the resolution, and was helping him to prepare his case. It must have been difficult for Mr. Lilley to forget his conference with Mr. Neff on February 10, 1908, immediately after the action of the naval committee. It has been shown that Mr. Lilley went down in one of the Lake company's boats with Mr. Neff the previous summer and that one night of the same summer Mr. Neff, at his hotel in Waterbury, dictated a telegram to Secretary of the Navy Metcalf in the interest of the Lake company. It needs no argument to show the logical sequence of events that tell the history of what led up to and constituted the propaganda which was designed, as indicated in the frank admission of Simon Lake, to educate the members of congress to the point of recognizing the merits of the Lake type of boat.  
**Did Not Want Investigation.**  
 "By stating on his honor and responsibility, as a member of this house, that he had information not based on hearsay requiring an investigation respecting the conduct of the company, he invoked the entire machinery of the house to institute proceedings against a private corporation for the benefit of another private corporation. The gravity of his offense is apparent. Six days prior to the introduction of the resolution, Mr. Lilley was doing everything in his power to help the Lake company, and after the introduction of the resolution the Lake company, through its officers and agents, was doing everything in its power to help Lilley.  
 "The committee does not doubt that the purpose of the resolution was not to secure an investigation, but legislation. Mr. Lilley never made any calculation on an investigation for the verification of facts, but used fictitious figures without question. He did not inquire concerning them of a friend of Congressman Hobson, who was in a position to inform him about them. He requested that certain naval officers be examined and then refused to take their word. It is characteristic of Mr. Lilley's attitude that when he learned that his suspicions of Mr. Loud were groundless he has never to this time expressed gratification at the removal of the cloud or made an apology or given an expression of regret that he should have made an unwarranted attack upon the honor and good name of a fellow member."

No recommendation is contained in the report.  
 Waterbury, Conn., May 20.—Representative Lilley refused to make any lengthy comment on the committee's report, declaring that he could not in justice to himself discuss it until after he had carefully read its contents and consulted his lawyers.  
 "The most serious and painful effect it has on me is its reflection on my personal honor," he said. "However, those who know me will not need any explanation. There is nothing in my private or public record that justified these reflections."

## DRY THROATS IN ST. JOHNS SUNDAY

### New Administration Enforcing Laws Despite Well-Established Traffic.

St. Johns, which has always been nominally a dry town on Sunday, but which has in reality been notoriously open via the rear entrance, is to be dry in the sense the law intends from henceforth.  
 Deputy District Attorney Stevenson has filed an information against three saloonmen of St. Johns and their cases are being tried in the east side justice court this afternoon. The men are Henry E. Knight, Luther M. Miller and John Dow. The first two are charged with selling beer to Charles Bennett last Sunday and receiving money for the same. The name of the last named offender was unknown to the complainant but he is charged with selling beer to a man named "Butch."  
 While the cases against the saloonmen are being prosecuted by the district attorney's office under the state law it is said by St. Johns men who should know that the movement to close the town tight was begun by the new city administration.  
 It is known that detectives have been working to secure evidence against the saloonmen that they cannot pay the \$1,000 license and do business without the Sunday trade. There are six saloons in St. Johns and the city therefore derives \$6,000 from license on Sunday a year. The new administration is evidently of the opinion that if six saloons do a legitimate business it is better to have only five. Whether this is
