CANDIDATES GOV. DESPITE APPLAUS

Only Four Attend Meeting of Republican County Central Committee.

Candidates were scarce at the meeting of the Republican county central committee, held last night in the headquarters in the Marquam building. Just four of them responded to the earnest call for their presence, and as a result nothing much was said about money, but an adjournment was taken until Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Enthusiasm ran high among the members of the central committee present at the meeting last night, the only drawback being that there were not present members in sufficient number. There are 114 members in the county central committee. Last night about 50 of the total number were present.

Four candidates, George J. Cameron for district attorney, Lou Wagner for constable, J. W. Bell for justice of the peace and Ben Norden for coroner, attended the meeting and were invited to meet in person where they could see and hear what was going on.

The precinct committees were called upon to outline the prospects in the different parts of the counties, and for the most part made glowing pronouncements. The general tenor of the addresses was to the effect that their precincts had from 300 to 400 Republican voters and 40 to 50 Democratic voters, and that the Republican candidates would be given a majority vote.

W. M. Cate, chairman of the state central committee and manager of the senatorial campaign of H. C. Cate, made the longest and most spirited address, and charged them with taking no active part in the election of the republican ticket.

D. L. Shaefer, a precinct committee man from Woodmen, said that his interest has been stirred up among the voters of that district by the issues of the present campaign, and it is expected that the meeting of tomorrow night will be a largely attended and enthusiastic one.
