Groom kept the bunch from across the bay guessing until the sixth inning. Over confidence in this inning came when Heinie Heltmuller and Van Halgren both got to first on Groom's generous gift of passes.

They have 5,000 cords in the pool and will fill this territory with cheap wood, they declare. The woodyards have large supplies on hand, owing to the fact that the mild weather of the past winter restricted the sale, and have refused to buy the Kamela pool, which is now being marketed here. Already several cars have been ordered from the pool and it promises to demoralize the wood market in the inland empire.
