The following official statement from the Oregon Brewers' association was sent The Journal with the request that it be published:
"We do not believe that the hysterical outbursts of paid agitators of the Anti-Saloon league will have any effect at all on the prominent business men of the east side who are doing business in the districts affected by the election.
