

VICTORY FOR CHICAGO UNION

Men Who Withdrew From Organization Pay Fines to Prevent Car Strike.

Chicago, May 22.—A general strike on all traction lines of the city was called today when the 20 employees who withdrew from the union sent a letter to General Manager Roch of the traction company, saying that, in the interests of peace and to save the city from disorder, they would pay their dues and fines to the union and relieve him of embarrassment in the matter. These men had been defeated in their efforts to secure an injunction restraining the union from opposing them because of withdrawal from the union but the manager of the system was disposed to stand by them.

ROOSEVELT WANTS TO PROMOTE BOB EVANS

Washington, May 22.—For the first time since he returned from his long cruise on the Atlantic fleet, Admiral Evans called on President Roosevelt today. Deer Lodge, Mont., May 22.—William Hays, a convict in the state prison here, was today found guilty of first-degree murder in killing Guard John A. Robinson in the course of the sensational prison break in March. George Rock pleaded guilty two weeks ago and was sentenced to hang June 15. Hays' defense proved he had not laid a hand on Robinson, but he was found guilty of conspiracy. The jury recommended hanging.

It will be retained by Rhodes and his interest in the mill will have charge of its actual running, while Mr. Rhodes will attend to the outside business.
