A serious fracture of the skull was sustained by Lester Frizzell, the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frizzell of this city, who while on a visit to his grandparents near Condon, fell from a tree. Two Condon physicians were called, and they relieved the boy by lifting the skull. The fracture extends from the right temple across the forehead above the left eye and continues to the back of the head. Mr. and Mrs. Frizzell with a nurse have gone to the child. In spite of the severity of the injury, physicians say that there is hope for his life.

The Unit/Share Associates, a Socialist concern, has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. It is headed by Walter Thomas Mills, the well-known lecturer and editor, now of Seattle. Associated with him are George F. Rogers and Benion Lind. The papers cover almost every form of business enterprise, including manufacturing, publishing, operation of mines, railroads, electric power plants, docks, factories, gas and electrical plants, as well as the right to own franchises and to own stock in other institutions.

Mayor Lane vetoed two ordinances today which will be sustained by the council next week. One is a measure appropriating \$500 for east side decorations during the Rose Festival and the other regulates junk dealers and pawnbrokers. The ordinance was vetoed because it provides for an expenditure unauthorized by the charter. The second veto will be sustained because of certain provisions which the councilmen will remedy in a new ordinance regulating pawnbrokers and junk dealers.

L. B. Smith, L. W. Humphreys and Frank Peters, members of the debating team of the law department of the University of Oregon, left last night for Seattle, where tonight they will engage a trio of champions from the law department of the University of Washington in forensic contest. The question for debate is, "Resolved, that the initiative and referendum should be adopted in the state of Washington." The Oregon debaters chose the negative side of the question.

The Multnomah Improvement club has passed resolutions censuring the city council for accepting a remonstrance filed against the improvement of Kerby street, which was not enough signatures on the remonstrance to make it legally effective. The club will ask the water board to replace the four-inch main on Maryland avenue between Fremont and Shaver streets. The club has also adopted resolutions calling upon the stores of the city to close at 8 o'clock Saturday afternoons.

James H. Cochrane, 647 1/2 First street, is now being hunted by the police department. Cochrane has a bad case of diphtheria and was under quarantine at the St. Vincent's sanitarium yesterday but managed to escape. He has not returned to his home and apprehension is felt by the authorities that he may infect other people with the disease.

A parlor and observation car will be put on the Pendleton local for the purpose of giving excursionists, and travelers generally, a daily opportunity to see the Columbia river gorge. The car will be between Portland and The Dalles, the new arrangement being effective June 1. The Pendleton local leaves at 7:15 a. m. and returns at 5:15 p. m.

The police have been notified to be on the lookout for Mrs. J. H. Loomis, 222 East Forty-third street. Her husband has informed them that she left his house yesterday morning and has not been seen since. She is said to have occasional delusions of dementia and it is feared she is now under the influence of one. She is 53 years of age.

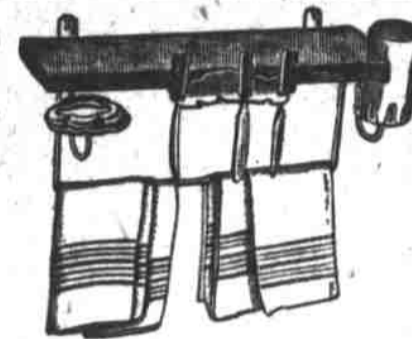
