BONAPARTE WILL NOT LEAVE POST

President Roosevelt and Attorney-General Deny Rumor of Quarrel.

Washington, May 23.—President Roosevelt declared today that he wished to set at rest the rumor that Attorney-General Bonaparte has threatened to resign and that there is any dissension between them over the suit filed by the department of justice against the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad under the Sherman anti-trust law. The president announced that he has no intention of suspending procedure against the corporation, as alleged. He admitted that a legal question did arise as to whether the suit should be brought in Boston or Connecticut, but that the former city was selected.

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Battleships on Way to Seattle

Bellingham People Entered Bluejackets Royal-y During Short Visit.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Bellingham, Wash., May 23.—When Rear Admiral Sperry led his seven battleships and his one historic hospital ship out of the harbor this morning at 6 o'clock and headed for the northward Seattle, he left a city proud of the American navy, proud of the men who make up its personnel from the middle west, and that these men can be with great profit hogs from Oregon. It will improve its program for the coming year by carrying more lecturers and equipment for showing the farmers the most successful methods of diversified farming.

Time for Questions. In the recent demonstrations the train was permitted to stop only one hour at each point. Next fall the trains will make two-hour stops at each point, and allow time for questions and discussions by the assembled farmers. The hearty cooperation of professors from the Oregon Agricultural college has been a complete reversal of present day farm methods in the inland empire. It is believed that Oregon cannot only be made to maintain its preeminence as a wheat producing empire, but it can make a great success of diversified farming.
