

ALL PANIC NEWS NOTES DROPS STOCKS OF CHICAGO

Some of the Leading Issues in the New York Market Drop Six Points During the Day—Weakest Since Last Fall.

New York, May 23.—Alarmed by the hint in yesterday's filing of a federal suit against the New Haven & Hartford railroad that there is to be no relaxation of energy in the anti-trust activity, the stock market went wild today. Securities were the weakest since the panic last fall.

SUICIDE PACT WITH DAUGHTER

Woman Seriously Wounds Herself and Shoots Bullet Through Girl's Hair.

Los Angeles, May 23.—Made desperate by continual business reverses, Mrs. Mary Jane Frame, proprietor of a tailoring establishment, today tried to carry out her part of a suicide pact, formed with her daughter, Eva Ida, and as a result is dangerously wounded, suffering from a self-inflicted gunshot wound in the breast. Her daughter is suffering from a shock caused by a bullet fired by her mother, passing through her hair.

HUGE CATS KILLED IN EASTERN OREGON

Game Warden and Stockman Watch 36 Hours and Get Their Game.

Pendleton, May 23.—Deputy Game Warden O. F. Turner of Umatilla county and Henry Lasinka, a prominent cattleman of Camas Prairie, have just killed two huge cougars which have been causing trouble in the stock business in the south part of the county for two years. These animals have killed and eaten perhaps 80 calves, several saddle ponies, and hundreds of sheep, and until this week all efforts to kill them have been unavailing. The two hunters found where the cougar had killed a buck in the mountains near Lasinka's ranch on Camas Prairie and at 5 o'clock Thursday evening took a position near the carcass of the deer. All night long in a drizzling rain and snow the hunters waited but the cougars did not return. All the following day the watch was kept up. Determined to kill their game, the hunters kept watch through the second night. About 3 o'clock in the morning the two cougars appeared, creeping cautiously toward the carcass of the deer. Waiting until the animals were feeding, the hunters each selected a cougar, counted three and fired simultaneously. Both cougars fell dead. The four legs of the largest specimen were killed in the Blue mountains. The cougars measured six feet and six inches from tip to tip and weighed about 150 pounds each. The carcasses are being mounted by a local taxidermist.

Chicago, May 23.—It is estimated that the cost to the newspapers of the country of giving the news of the Republican national convention this year will be \$250,000. Although the convention is still six weeks off, the preparations for it have been put actively under way with the opening of headquarters this week by Secretary Dover of the national committee and the letting of contracts for red, white and blue bunting. From the reports that have been received and the reports of the press correspondents it will be the largest political gathering ever held in this country. It is likely also to be the most fully illustrated of any government policy. St. Paul broke 6 points, Union Pacific 6 1/2, Southern Pacific 6, Illinois Central 4 1/2, Reading 6, Northern Missouri Pacific 5 1/2, Rock Island preferred 5 1/2. Declines in the general list varied up to three points. The news arrangements of a big convention, in which everybody in the country is interested, are one of its most important features. Surrounding them are platoons of chairs and tables, hundreds of them altogether, numbered and separated for assignment to individual newspapers. Clashes at hand are the rooms assigned to the telegraph companies, the press associations and papers requiring increased facilities.

These rooms will be fully equipped with telephones and instruments with long-distance connections will be placed on the desks of the writers in the main hall, so that not an instant's time will be lost in communicating the affairs of the convention to the world.

No Toys for Babies.

Babies of two continents next Christmas will find St. Nick's pack to be light. It is foreboding. Toy dealers here and throughout the United States have materially reduced their orders. In January, however, the export of toys from Germany to the United States amounted to 360 tons. This was a little more than half the amount in 1907, when the figures for the same period showed an export of 364 tons to this country. Two things caused the decrease. In the first place, the financial stringency here caused a marked falling off in the American trade. On top of this discouraged the German toy manufacturers of toys have attempted to raise their prices from 10 to 15 per cent, which buyers in this country refused to do. It closed the foreign markets to a large extent. In Chicago the books of the collectors of customs show that in April, 1907, German toys to the value of \$1,584 were imported by Chicago firms. In 1908, during the same month, only \$1,120 worth were received. Only shows a drop of nearly one half in the Chicago toy trade. One of the largest toy dealers in the city says that his purchases from Germany this year will be at least 40 per cent less than usual. He says, however, that his importations will be cut down a third. As a result, all this the American toy makers are in a desperate condition, the home toy-makers especially, while in the country the hours of labor, number of employes and salaries have been reduced.

Entertaining Children.

"The story hour" has come to be an established innovation for entertainment to the children in Chicago parks and public libraries, with King Arthur's adventures and fairy lore to entertain play-weary and work-weary youngsters. The purpose of the women here proposes that November 1st be put to rest to use in character-building, and they have made Robie Hood, a useful purpose in preventing "bedlam" and making it easier to see how quick the children are to absorb and apply good stories," one sponsor for the plan says.

Eastern Cities Have Taken the Lead in Providing Reading in the Schools to Supplement the routine reading. Only recently Greek myths and their art were put into form by the Frangs of New York for comprehension by children, the writer having brought out as never before the heroic motives and meanings of those old classics. In many ways children are getting more consideration from their elders and "the powers that be" in Chicago each year. An organization here proposes that November 1st of each year be set aside as "children's day" and that festivities for youngsters only be held, in which "grown-ups" shall duly take notice that children have rights which should be observed.

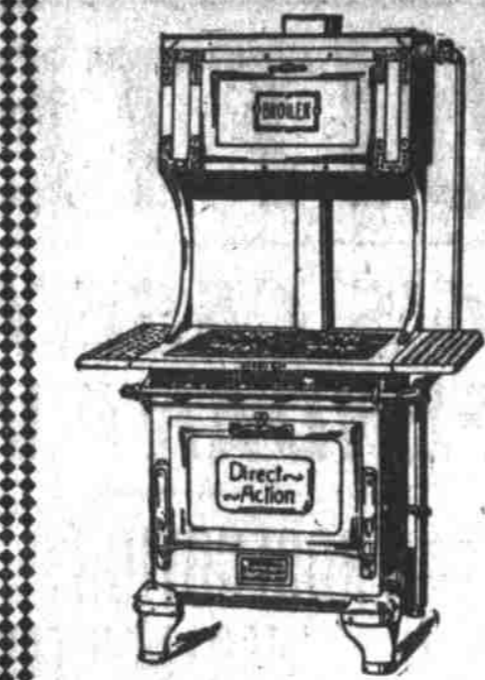
Norway's Representative.

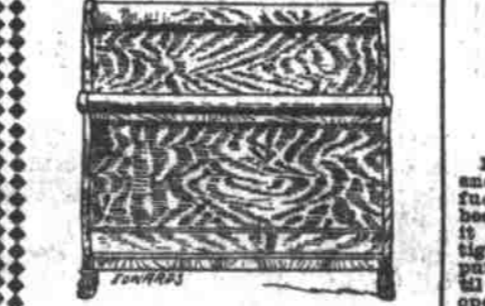


This pattern has 18-inch direct action oven with broiler separate, and a warming closet as shown. Price, connected to stub in kitchen \$50.00

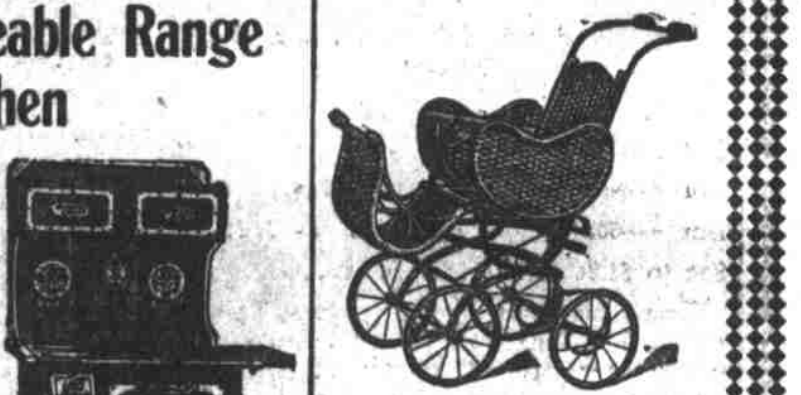

GERMANS ANGRY AT FRENCHMAN

Kaiser's Subjects Declare Paris Clubs Are Mere Gambling Houses.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Berlin, May 23.—Denouncing Paris clubs as mere gambling resorts and clubsmen as card sharps and blacklegs the German court and press are declaring today that it is easy enough to see why Teuton members are unwelcome—they have something better to do with their time than to spend it at a gaming table. But for the comment by members of the Cercle de L'Union that Germans are regardless of French club custom, the blackballing of Ambassadorial Attaché Hortsmann might have been permitted to pass as a personal matter.

The French clubmen's contemptuous estimate of German adaptability to their customs, however, has made the affair almost one for government action. The Berlin papers say that it will go so far as to make unlikely, but Ambassador Prince Radolin's resignation from his Paris post there is said to be a growing probability. The Kaiser is said to be in personal correspondence with him concerning the matter.

GUNS WILL FIRE ON OLD VESSEL

Most Sensational Naval Experiment Ever Attempted Takes Place Monday.

Washington, May 23.—The most sensational naval experiment ever attempted by this country will take place Monday in Chesapeake bay when the monitor Florida will be submitted to bombardment by big guns and torpedoes to demonstrate the effect of modern projectiles upon the internal fittings and the structure of the fighting craft of the American navy.

The Florida is so constructed and fitted internally in such a way as to have practically the same strength of resistance as the latest type of American battleship.

At first it was proposed to put live shells in the turret of the monitor, but this plan has been abandoned because it is believed the death of the animals would prove little as to the probability of loss of human life under similar circumstances. The plan to test the ability of the modern ship of war to withstand the heavy firing of the latest big guns has attracted much attention in official circles and it is looked upon as a matter of great importance by foreign officials at the embassy here.

LAMPHERE WILL ANSWER CHARGE

Former Farmhand Accused of Murder in First Degree by Prosecutor.

La Porte, Ind., May 23.—Coroner Mays tonight returned a verdict of murder in the case of Jennie Olsen, Ole Sudberg and the unidentified man and woman, the four bodies found in one grave in Mrs. Guinness' graveyard. State's Attorney Smith announced tonight that Ray Lamphere would be tried on a charge of murder in the first degree.

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RELEASE MAE WOOD ON BOND

Woman Indicted for Perjury Because of Platt Scandal Will Be Freed.

New York, May 23.—Miss Catherine Wood, held at the Tombs awaiting investigation by the grand jury on the charge of perjury in connection with her suit against Thomas Collier Platt, will be released on bond Monday. Some of whose identity has not been disclosed has made arrangements with the American Surety company to furnish \$5,000 for the woman called at the district attorney's office this afternoon prepared to put up the \$5,000 in cash but the office was closed and the matter will go over until Monday. Miss Wood was greatly disappointed that she could not be released this afternoon.
