

# GO AFTER BIG TRADE

The Export and Import Lumber Company Incorporated in Portland by W. D. Wheelwright and Others to Extend Trade.

With a view of extending trade relations in the Philippines, The Export and Import Lumber Company has been incorporated in this city by William D. Wheelwright, J. F. Quirk and D. L. Blodgett. Mr. Wheelwright is president of the Pacific Export Lumber Company and recognized as the largest exporter of lumber on the Pacific coast. Mr. Blodgett is secretary for the Pacific Export Lumber company and Mr. Quirk is bookkeeper for the same concern.

The capital stock of the new concern is \$100,000. It will take over the business of E. W. Cadwallader, who for several years has represented Mr. Wheelwright in Manila, and William W. Payne, formerly of this city, but of later representing Mr. Wheelwright in Shanghai, China, will have charge of the Manila office.

The Pacific Export Lumber company has worked up an enormous lumber business in China during the past few years until now it is in position to conduct its transactions there direct with the buyers and the establishment of headquarters at Manila is therefore taken to mean that Portland's lumber trade with the islands will be greatly increased in the near future.

## POSTOFFICE ROBBERS AT LEMANDA PARK

Los Angeles, Cal., May 23.—A report was received by the postoffice inspectors in this city today that robbers last night blew open the safe in the postoffice at Lamanda Park, near Pasadena, and stole \$200 in money and \$400 worth of postage stamps.

The robbers first broke into a blacksmith shop and with tools secured there they knocked off the combination knobs of the postoffice safe.

The robbery was not discovered until this morning when the postmaster opened the office.

## LET CONTRACT FOR NEW BANK AT BAKER

Baker City, May 23.—At a meeting of the directors of the Citizens National bank last evening the contract for erecting the new bank building on the corner of Washington and Front streets was let. Johnson & Peterson of Boise, Idaho, were the successful bidders. As estimated, the building will probably cost \$30,000 when completed. Native stone will be used in its construction and it will contain two stories and a basement. The first floor is to be used by the banking institution and the basement and second floor will be rented for office rooms.

# NO PLACE FOR CHRIST'S NAME

Washington Prohibitionists Who Revere It, Keep It Out of Platform.

Seattle, Wash., May 23.—In a turbulent meeting the 100 delegates to the state prohibition convention, with only a few dissenting today voted down a motion to include the words "We accept Jesus Christ, our Savior, as our leader," in the preamble of their political platform. The decision resulted after an exciting 10 minutes of debate, in which bitter words were exchanged, in the convention voted to work for local option, but to hold out for prohibition.

In the convention platform as recommended by the committee the preamble read:

"We acknowledge Almighty God as the sovereign of the universe. To the providential hand we are grateful for the guidance and strength during the long political struggle that we have made for the supremacy of the principles embodied in the declaration of independence and the federal constitution."

Unnecessary Loss of Votes.

J. C. Thomas introduced his measure to incorporate the words referring to the leadership of Christ. The motion was quickly seconded and in a moment the convention was in a tumult. Rev. William DeWesse of Ellensburg lead the opposition.

"I am a believer in Jesus Christ as a leader," he said, "but I am thoroughly opposed to inserting the words in a political platform. There are many people who are prohibitionists, but who do not recognize the leadership of Christ, and if we insert those words we are opposing their religion and losing support."

Chairman Dunlap put the question and said, "It would be extremely unfortunate if such a thing should creep into our platform."

Delegates attended the convention from every county in the state but there were few women present, the meeting being purely political.

Rev. A. L. Crim, pastor of the First Christian church of Ballard, was named as chairman of the state central committee. Rev. W. M. Kellogg, postmaster at Malibu, aroused the ire of his fellow delegates when he called them traitors to the national government and to the constitution, because they voted for a plank favoring the initiative and referendum. The plank carried, but only one dissenting vote. When the chairman, at Rev. A. L. Crim's advice, said he would limit the speaker to three minutes, Mr. Kellogg protested that he was being gagged.

Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago spoke on party principles. In the afternoon Clinton N. Howard of Rochester, New York, made an address before a big audience of prohibitionists.
