Leading Men of State Say Defeat of Appropriation Bill Would Be Disastrous Blow to Prosperity and Progress of Oregon.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, May 23.—That the defeat of the university appropriation bill would be most injurious to the state of Oregon is the general opinion of a very large part of the state's leading citizens.

We Need a Great University. I believe the University appropriation will carry by 20,000 majority, and I hope it will. We want to build up a great university here, where we may educate our sons and daughters without sending them outside the state.

No Better Use for Funds. The great state of Oregon can not use its public funds to better advantage than enlarging, equipping and endowing the university at Eugene.

A Good University or None. We ought to have a good university or none at all. If we want a good university, then of course it must have the means to make it good.

Essential to Welfare of State. I regard the maintenance of the State university at a high standard essential to the welfare of the state, and will vote for the appropriation if in Oregon at election time.

Would Place Oregon Second. In my opinion an adverse vote on the appropriation bill at the coming election would be the means of placing the state of Oregon rearward in educational matters, and we could hope to obtain but little immigration of an educational character.

Should Not Be Defeated. There are three reasons especially why the University of Oregon appropriation bill should not be defeated.

Incalculable Damage. I am a staunch supporter of the university, and do not hesitate in asserting that an adverse vote on the University of Oregon appropriation at the June election would result in incalculable damage to the state's development and growth.

Misfortune to the State. I think that an adverse vote on the University of Oregon appropriation would be about the most serious misfortune that could possibly happen to Oregon.

School Superintendent Oregon County. Destroy the Future of the State. The list of "casualties" in the event of the defeat of the University of Oregon appropriation bill would be too long for enumeration.

Attorney-at-Law, Echo, Oregon. Behind Other States. An adverse vote on the University of Oregon appropriation bill would have this effect: It would place Oregon behind other states in their wishes to support public institutions of learning.

Would Be Disastrous. I would regard an adverse vote upon the pending university appropriation bill as a disaster from which the state would require years to recover.

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YAMHILL PROUD OF DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE

Democratic Committee Indorses Governor and Rule of People. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) McMinnville, Or., May 23.—The Democratic County Central committee met here today and elected the following delegates to the state convention, June 9: C. V. Galloway, Hubert Bernard, H. Hummel, Lee Peters, F. H. Caldwell, R. L. Harris and Dr. Hastings.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "Resolved, That we the Democratic County Central committee, representing the Democratic party of Yamhill county, are united in support of our peerless Governor Chamberlain, not merely that he is a Democrat, but because of his high standard of citizenship, both as a private citizen and as a public official.

Resolved, That we heartily indorse the direct primary, as set forth in Statement No. 1, which has been adopted by the free and untrammelled suffrage of the people of this state, and we hereby respectfully urge its adoption, and recommend that all voters support the legislative candidates elected to the state legislature at the polls, having been duly nominated by an assembly of electors held in McMinnville, April 25, 1908."

NO CONNECTING SWITCHES YET. South Portland Manufacturers Again Appeal to the State Commission. (Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., May 23.—Because the Southern Pacific has refused to agree to a connecting switch between its tracks in South Portland and the tracks of the United Railways, the manufacturing concerns tributary to those tracks in South Portland have applied to the railroad commission again for assistance.

The railroad commission in a recent order recommended that the United Railways and the manufacturers reach an agreement for the installation of this connecting switch, but reserved the right to subsequent jurisdiction if any trouble should arise.

The United Railways is willing to build and put up all the expense and the Southern Pacific, it seems, will ultimately have to agree to the building of such a switch.

This connection means much to South Portland manufacturers. At present the cars from the Portland and West Side divisions of the Southern Pacific in order to reach the union depot at Portland, for shipment to other points in the state or in the east, by this connection the cars would haul over the Front street line into the union depot in a few minutes.

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TAKES WOODBURN DECISION ON HIM

Chamberlain Arouses Enthusiasm and Scores for Added Votes. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Woodburn, Or., May 23.—A large gathering greeted Governor Chamberlain in this city this afternoon and it was aroused to a high pitch of enthusiasm. The meeting was addressed by Francis Feller, chairman, August Huckenstein, Grant Corby and P. L. Frazier of Salem and Governor Chamberlain.

The governor predicted his election as United States senator by a large vote than he received two years ago, for government. He denounced the old convention method and referred to the recent Republican state convention as a glaring example.
