### DEMOCRATS ASK CHANCE TO ACT

#### Are With Roosevelt Republicans, Either Now or in Special Session.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, May 25.—John Sharp Williams said last night: "The Democracy is standing solid and still tendering a full Democratic vote in the house, to any 30 independent Republicans to pass or consider a bill for a pre-election publication of campaign contributions, a bill to secure the liberty of the citizen by a modification of the powers exercised by the inferior federal courts in connection with injunctions, a bill to safeguard the rights and dignity of states against the same sort of attack, a bill to put wood pulp and print paper on the free list, a bill for a model insurance law in the District of Columbia. The Democracy will continue to present itself for a vote of alliance. It will vote against any motion for a fixed date to adjourn, and announces now, as it has announced all along and will announce on the last day of the session, that it is ready and anxious to continue at the post of duty for an extra session to be called by the president if he is in earnest and really desirous to have passed remedial legislation as indicated in the foregoing list of measures approved by Democrats."

### DEADLY GAS DESTROYS VENTURESOME BURGLAR

Stuttgart, May 25.—A chemical firm in the small town of Aalen has perfected and patented an invention that threatens burglars with instant death after they succeed in opening a safe or vault door, either by skeleton key or with the aid of compressed air, nitro-glycerine and other burglar's paraphernalia. The moment an outsider opens the door, or bores through it, poisonous gases are released, destroying the invader and leaving him dead on the floor.
