FINE AVERAGES FOR SEMI-PROS

Philbrick and McConnell Have Perfect Fielding Scores.

Local fans are at all times interested in the work of the young semi-professionals who are, many of them, gaining their first experience in organized ball. Some of these young men will recruit the ranks of the professionals in major or minor company and many of them now show the signs of cleverness and ability that will earn them good salaries in the future.

The Tri-City league is a fine preparatory school for the embryo leaguers and the officials are as jealous of the records of the players as if the organization was one of major magnitude. Secretary H. K. Smith has compiled a percentage table from the official score sheets of Tri-City games which enables the fans to draw a line on the playing of the different infielders signed up on the several teams in the league. Some of these records are good, some mighty good, and easily stamp the men making them as apt pupils for bigger company.

These percentages are figured for only such men as have taken part in two or more games and do not include games played since May 1. McConnell of the Vancouver Pioneers and Captain Philbrick of the St. Johns Apostles have phenomenal marks, each being in the 1000 class. Mangold of Woodburn easily leads the second sackers. Thomas of the East Portlanders has the Indian sign on the short-stops and Philbrick of St. Johns is the premier third sacker, although Day of the West Portlanders is second.

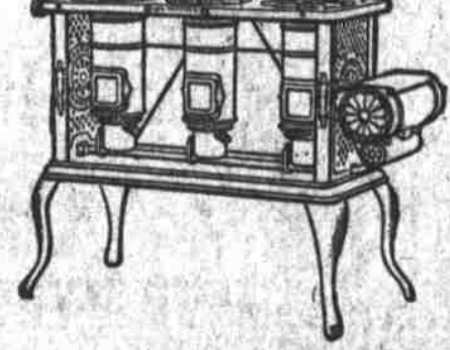
