DEAD WHALE IN FRONT YARD! NOW WOULDN'T THAT STIFLE YOU?

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Newport, Or., May 27.—W. F. Keady of Waldport, nominee on the Democratic ticket for county commissioner of Lincoln county, is probably the only man in Oregon who keeps a whale in his front yard. Keady is the sole owner, though not the proud owner, of a whale 78 feet in length, which came some days ago and camped on the beach just in front of his house on Alsea bay. The only consolation Keady has is that as a result of the monster's visit he will probably have one of the finest lawns in Lincoln county. The whale, which apparently had died some time before of old age, dropsy or excessive weight, drifted into the mouth of Alsea bay some time ago, being driven in by high winds and tides. It first went ashore on the north beach, just in front of the residence of Captain Nice. It remained there only a day or so, however, when it moved farther up the bay and stranded in front of the cannery. A fine opportunity to put up some choice Packingtown whale was missed on account of the fact that the cannery had not yet opened up for the season. Cremation Keady's Only Hope. The whale again shifted its quarters, drifting back toward the mouth of the bay, and finally going ashore on the sandy beach in front of Keady's place. By this time the animal was getting decidedly odoriferous, and to make matters worse a strong south wind sprang up and blew steadily for three days, carrying the smell directly toward Keady's house and making the place smell like a fertilizer works. Keady was just preparing to pack up and move out when the wind changed and life became once more endurable. Since the middle of last week Keady has put in most of his time trying to get rid of his whale. The animal is too big to be moved, even if there were any place to move it to, and it would take weeks to dig a hole deep enough and long enough to bury the carcass in. But the beach is piled high with thousands of cords of driftwood. Only Forty-eight Feet Left Now. Keady collected several cords of this and piled the huge logs on top of and about the whale, setting fire to the mass. For several days it has been burning fiercely, the oil in the whale's blubber adding to the flames. Today Keady announced that he had succeeded in burning up at least 30 feet of his whale, leaving him only 48 feet more of the whale to dispose of. The burning of the whale has left the ground piled high with the finest quality of bone ash, white and brittle, which will make excellent fertilizer. Keady is collecting this in sacks, and says he will scatter it over his yard and sow grass seed. He believes his whale will yield him the finest blue grass lawn to be found in the west. But all the neighbors still take to the high ground when the wind blows off the whale.

MANNING'S WAY PROVES COSTLY

Special Counsel Is Always Hired to Do Work District Attorney Is Paid For.

LINNTON CITIZENS HEAR REPUBLICANS

Cameron Also Declares Manning Made Fish of Title Guarantee and Flesh of Oregon Trust, Despite His Promise.

Voters of Linnton to the number of 260 or more, crowded the public hall at that place last evening to listen to speeches by the Republican candidates for sheriff and district attorney. Both Sheriff Stevens and Judge George J. Cameron were well received, to judge by the applause that greeted them, and what they had to say was listened to with marked attention. Sheriff Stevens, who was the first speaker to make his bow to the assembly, spoke briefly, referring to his record as an official and pointing to the official records for proof of the statement that he had conducted the office economically and fairly. He promised if re-elected to pursue the same policies in the future that have governed his official acts in the past. Expensive Special Counsel. The strong points brought out by Judge Cameron in his speech were those that had a bearing on economy and impartiality. The present district attorney, he said, is given five deputies who are paid from \$125 to \$150 each. The district attorney's salary is \$4,000 a year. Yet the county, which means the taxpayers, was forced to pay the sum of \$2,700 between the months of January and May of this year for special counsel to prosecute cases that should have been prosecuted by the district attorney. Besides this, approximately \$1,000 was paid to two inexperienced attorneys during the same period, with no detective work was needed. Judge Cameron also made the startling statement and challenged truthful denial, that during all of the time John Manning has filled the office of district attorney he has never noted an appearance in the court of any of the state nor have any of his deputies appeared for him or the office, although many important cases in which the state was a party have during that period been sent to the supreme court for adjudication. The interests of the taxpayers of the county in these cases have always been left in the hands of special counsel, and the burden of expense incident to their employment has been shouldered by the community. He said that district attorney and five deputies for duties they do not perform. How About Oregon Trust? Referring to the prosecution of Banker Klose the speaker said: "Mr. Manning has never explained why he refuses to prosecute the officials of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank. Many of you will remember that day when Mr. Manning came to Portland on horseback from somewhere up the Columbia river and made a speech in the Plaza. In that speech he declared that if any wrong had been done depositors by the officials of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank they would be prosecuted and sent to the penitentiary. The officials of the bank, however, and none is contemplated. Why? Look over the list of names of officials of that rotten institution and you can guess the reason. If you will recall that list carefully and understandingly you will see why Mr. Manning has not prosecuted the officials of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank. Political flub-dub sometimes covers a multitude of sins, but think the taxpayers who pay the bills and the people whose interests have been neglected and ignored may safely be counted on to judge for themselves whether Mr. Manning is doing his duty or playing to the gallery."

BURGLAR TURNS WITH TWO GUNS HOBDES SET OUT TO LOOT A TOWN

Centralia, Wash., May 27.—The house of Ed Wolf in north Centralia was entered by a burglar yesterday afternoon during the absence of the family and robbed of \$30, a pistol and several other articles more or less valuable. The man had for some unknown reason removed his coat while doing his plundering. When he was about to leave the house, and before donning his coat, Mr. Wolf put in an appearance and made a dash for the robber, who ran, leaving the coat behind. Wolf was fast gaining on the fugitive, when the latter turned suddenly and opened fire with two pistols. Mr. Wolf, being unarmed, dropped to the ground when the firing began. The bullets went wide of their mark. Mr. Wolf pursued no further but immediately notified the police. The man escaped from town minus his coat and will doubtless be captured, as notice was immediately wired to the officers of neighboring towns. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) 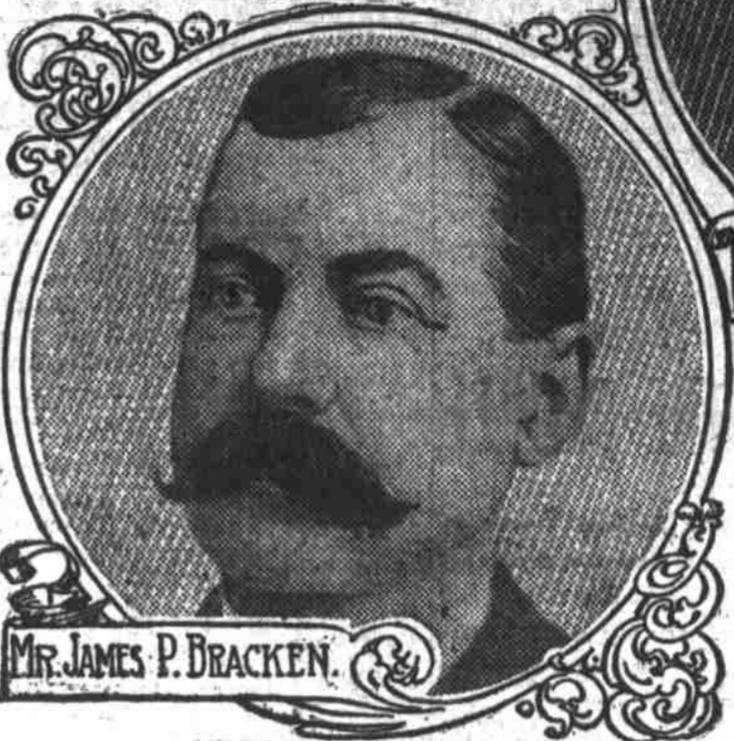

DEVICE THAT GIVES AERONAUTS OXYGEN WHEN AT HIGH ALTITUDES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) New York, May 27.—A new device has just been put into operation by aeronauts in England by which one may ascend to great heights in balloons without the intense suffering from lack of oxygen in the air. At an altitude of about 7,000 feet there is a third less oxygen in the air than at the earth's surface, and the quantity diminishes steadily as the altitude increases. The instrument gives to the aeronaut an artificial supply of oxygen which he may mingle with the air he breathes as it is required. By the aid of this device aeronauts may now ascend in safety to heights which it has heretofore been impossible to attain.

CLINTON'S MEMORY HONORED.

Washington, May 27.—The body of General George Clinton, one of the heroes of the American revolution, first governor of the state of New York and twice vice-president of the United States, which was exhumed last week after resting nearly a century in the Congressional cemetery of Christ parish, was honored with a notable military and civic escort today on its departure from the city for New York. The body will be reburied next Saturday in Kingston, New York, Governor Clinton's native town, and where he took the oath of office as first governor of the state in 1777.
