**ULMO WAILED LIKE A WOMAN**

French Naval Officer Broke Down When End of Trial Drew Near.

**POVERTY WAS PLEA FOR HIGH TREASON**

Opium Habit Caused Downfall of Man Who Has Just Been Transported to Prison for Life—Parisian Playwright Writes on Divorce.

Paris, May 27.—Ulmo, the French officer, who was tried last February for high treason, as you dispatches told at the time, has just been transported to prison for life. His attitude during the trial was firm and manly, but at the end has been most pitiful. He cried like a woman, declared that his poverty forced him to sell the documents about national defenses, to get necessary money, and further excused his act by pleading his devotion to the opium habit. His trial has profoundly moved the public, but with a feeling of hostility against the prisoner.

**Calamity of Divorce.**  
Paul Bourget, the playwright, writing the new comedy, "Un Divorce," which has just been finished, says that he has attempted in it to emphasize the recent calamity of divorce, which is fatal for the preservation of the family and for social unity and has exposed the American method, which under the shield of the law, sanctifies marriages, and produces a system of legal polygamy, with the pharisaic pretext of saving morality.

Prince Albert of Monaco has advertised the Parisian creditors of his son, Prince Louis, that he will not be responsible for his debts.

**Republic Empty Dream.**  
The Portuguese writer, Silva Lisboa, declares that a republic in Portugal is an empty dream without the support of the army.

The French government has reduced the import duties on petroleum and Porto Rico coffee, machines and cereals; it also has reduced the amount of microscopic examinations of American meats and permits them to cross French territory.—In return the United States agrees to reduce the duties on champagne and foaming wines by 20 per cent and to modify the provisions of the pure food law to accord with the French demands.

A band of robbers have attempted to enter the museum of the Louvre, to abstract the historic diamond, known as the Regent, but were caught in the attempt. The authorities have ordered an investigation to learn how the robbers got to the place where they were discovered.

**CANDIDATE WHO FIGHTS HIMSELF**

Boosts Himself Personally but Has to Knock Himself Officially.

Newport, Or., May 27.—W. F. Keady of Waldport, Lincoln county, 16 miles south of Newport, who is running on the Democratic ticket as candidate for county commissioner, occupies probably one of the strangest situations in the political history of Oregon. Keady is a registered Republican who was defeated at the primaries for his party's nomination, but without the knowledge of his own name was written in on the Democratic ticket and to the surprise of everybody it was found that he had received the Democratic nomination. He accepted this, but nevertheless is acting as private secretary to Frank Buer of Waldport, chairman of the Republican county central committee, and in that capacity is compelled to write and send out to the voters of the county letters urging them to vote the straight Republican ticket, and defeat himself.

Keady explains his peculiar position by saying that on account of the fact that primary day was wet and rainy, only 450 of the registered Republicans of the county came out and cast their votes, and he refuses to accept the result as expressing the will of the party. He still classes himself a Republican though on the Democratic ticket and says that after the election he will return to the fold. Meantime he is touring the county in an effort to offset the effect of the letters against himself which as Buer's secretary he is obliged to send out. He expresses himself as confident of being elected.

**Julia Ward Howe's Birthday.**

Boston, May 27.—Mrs. Julia Ward Howe, author of the immortal "Battle Hymn of the Republic," and famous as a writer, lecturer and reformer, entered upon her ninetieth year today. She passed the day quietly at her home on Beacon street, surrounded by her children. During the day many flowers, congratulations and other tokens of esteem, were received from friends and from organizations with which the noted writer has been identified. Mrs. Howe enjoys excellent health for a woman of her years, and continues to take a more

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or less active interest in public affairs and the questions of the day. During the past winter she has appeared in public on several occasions, and has been heard on these subjects in which she has been so largely interested during her long and remarkable career.

**Japan Keeps Anniversary.**
