The tragedy occurred this morning about 2:15 o'clock. It is reported that one of the two men who were occupying a room alone and that he attacked her, and she called for help brought in Fred Williams. The other is that all three were in the room together and that the two men got into a fight.

Williams was immediately run to the room occupied by Mary Keiser and Noyuz and found engaged in a fight.

Williams grabbed Noyuz and threw him across the room. That he says is the extent of his injury. He was dispossessed of Noyuz in this manner he walked out of the hotel and down the street, wearing his coat and hat.

After arresting Williams the two officers turned their attention to Noyuz who was lying insensible on the floor. The wagon was called and Noyuz, Mary Keiser and Fred Williams were taken to the hospital.

Noyuz's body was removed to the undertaking establishment of Finley & Sons this morning. Coroner Finley will hold an inquest tonight or tomorrow.

BRIBERY CHARGE AGAINST FORMER RECEIVER OF ROSEBURG LAND OFFICE
