

DALLAS CHEERS CHAMBERLAIN

People From All That Section Attend Gathering— Cake Meeting Frosty.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Dallas, Or., May 28.—Governor George E. Chamberlain, Democratic candidate for United States senator, was greeted at the opera house last night by an audience that crowded the building to its doors, many not being able to gain admission.

The principal points of the governor's address were in reference to the people's right to have a voice in the selection of the men who represent them in the United States senate, and compared this manner of selection with the conditions in existence in the state legislatures in the past.

In the primaries, Folk county was in the Fulton lists and that is a great deal of soreness among the leading Republicans as to the manner in which their candidate was turned down.

WASHINGTON THEATRES MUST CLOSE SUNDAYS
