NELSON FAILED TO MAKE RECORD

Roseburg, Or., May 28.—Fernando Nelson, who attempted to lower the time made by the regular passenger trains from San Francisco to Portland, in his White steamer, had the misfortune to break a flange at Wolf Creek, about 68 miles south of this city, yesterday morning, and was compelled to give up the time test. He arrived in Roseburg at noon today, and will probably go on to Portland to better acquaint himself with the road. He is very cheerful, and will make another trial later in the summer. The road where he met with his mishap is barely passable with a team, and for about 25 miles it is more like a trail than a wagon road through low creek canyons. However, several autos have passed through there this spring, and only one was entirely unable to get there and lay by for repairs.

PROVISIONS OF CURRENCY BILL

"Faith Cure" Issue Can Only Aggregate \$500,000,000 Subject to Tax.

Washington, May 28.—The main provisions of the "faith cure" currency bill, agreed on yesterday by the house and slated to pass the senate today, are as follows:

Emergency currency may be issued up to an aggregate of \$500,000,000. It will be subject to retirement tax at six per cent for the first two months and one per cent per month thereafter until a total of 10 per cent is reached.

State, county and municipal bonds acceptable as security for 30 per cent market value; other bonds and commercial paper for 75 per cent market value.

A bank may take out emergency currency in excess of 80 per cent of its capital stock and surplus on accompanying paper. No emergency may be taken out at all unless the bank is ready to take out, under present law, currency equal to 40 per cent of capital and surplus.

Banks holding state, county or municipal bonds, with approval of the secretary of the treasury, may take out additional currency directly upon them for 90 per cent of their market value on their individual initiative and responsibility.

Commercial paper may be used as basis of issuance only by banks affiliated in groups with aggregate capital and surplus of not less than \$5,000,000 to be known as currency associations.

A currency commission to be composed of nine members of the house and nine senators will be created.

The Democratic senators decided today at a conference that they will make no filibuster in an effort to block the passage of the currency bill.

This is taken to mean that final adjournment of the senate will occur tonight or Friday and that the bill is adopted yesterday by the house will become law.

EDUCATE PUBLIC TO EARLY CLOSING PLAN

Purpose of Publicity Bureau for Which Funds Will Be Provided.

At last night's meeting of the general committee of the Saturday night closing movement it was agreed to recommend to the Consumers' League the organization of a publicity bureau, to carry on a systematic agitation for the closing of all business houses at 6 o'clock in the evening every day in the week.

Miss Constance McCorkie and E. A. Harris were named as a committee to secure a suitable person for the active head of this bureau.

The secretary was instructed to communicate with all organizations affiliated with the league, asking for a small monthly donation to meet the expenses of the proposed publicity bureau. It was also agreed to address letters to all the business firms in the city, asking them to close their places of business at 6 o'clock. Washington, May 28.—Republican and Democratic members of the house committee considering the printing paper tariff question today were flatly divided in their report, the Republicans opposing the removal of the tariff and the Democrats urging that it be removed at once. The report was laid before the house today by Chairman James H. Dillingham.

The Republican members reported in part:

"As the present price of paper would not be affected immediately in any considerable degree by the repeal of the tariff and as the passage of the Stevens bill would result in ruin for the paper industry in this country, the committee recommends that any positive legislation on this subject be laid over until the completion of the investigation now being conducted and action be taken at the next session of congress."
