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LAMPBLACK TO STAY IN CEMENT

Majority of Council Unexpectedly Votes to Return Darkening Substance.

Efforts to repeal the lampblack ordinance yesterday met with a signal failure, much to the surprise of persons who followed the action of the street committee Monday when a report was put in asking that the ordinance be cast aside at the behest of the contractors.

For a time the council resembled several of the fiery meetings of last winter when Vaughn and members of the majority party had a clash every few minutes. However, yesterday the majority stood nearly as a unit with Vaughn, which caused the spectators to wonder whether the majority party was still the same intact body that it was last winter when the members stood solidly together on every measure that came up whether it was for a large appropriation or for a permit granting some person permission to hang a banner across a street.

The objection to lampblack in the cement sidewalks was raised by certain contractors and property owners who felt that the lampblack resulted in giving the sidewalks a blotched appearance, and also reduced the strength of the cement.

Defenders of the measure stated that the bright light reflected upon the plain cement sidewalks was detrimental to the eyesight of the pedestrians. Lampblack would give the necessary protection.

Councilman Concannon attacked the petition signed by anybody would sign a petition whether they knew what they were signing or not. He said he knew personally that many of the physicians who signed the petition would refuse to treat a person afflicted with eye trouble and upon this basis the assumption that the lampblack would cure eye disease then the councilmen.

This aroused the ire of Councilman Vaughn, who took exception to the remark and he told Concannon that he might sign things he did not know about but that other people were more careful in regard to such matters. Concannon replied that Vaughn, too, would sign petitions of such nature. Vaughn replied that he would not and the councilmen Democrats in the council had it back and forth much to the delight of the 13 Republican members. The vote finally showed that eight members favored retaining the lampblack in the sidewalks while five opposed it.
