ALLIANCE PLAN DISMISSED

Visit of Fallieres to England Unsuccessful in Its Real Object.

(United Press Lease Wire.)
London, May 29.—It became known today that the real object of the visit of President Fallieres of France to England was the establishment of an Anglo-French alliance and that the purpose has failed, so far as any formal action is concerned. President Fallieres before embarking this afternoon for Calais spoke freely of his designs, saying: "I deeply regret that my visit to England has failed to result in the establishment of a formal Anglo-French alliance or at least in preparatory steps leading to one."

"The hospitality of the English people has been most thoroughly enjoyed by me and my visit has been delightful, but it was my hope that the two nations could be brought closer and more firmly together by the formation of an alliance."

THOUSAND ON WALLOWA LINE

Work on Extension of Elgin Branch Will Be Rushed Through.

La Grande, Or., May 29.—General Superintendent J. M. Buckley of the O. R. & N., who was in La Grande yesterday, gave it out that 1,000 men will be at work on the Wallowa extension of the Elgin branch within two weeks. Half of these men will be direct employ of the railroad company. Much of the grading was finished last fall, and the roadbed only needs to be leveled to be ready for the tracklayers. Yesterday a carload of tenting was sent out to the extension. Mr. Buckley says the work done will be of such a character as to insure permanence.

FINAL CHAPTER IN ANCIENT TRAGEDY

La Grande, Or., May 29.—Considerable interest among the inhabitants of Union county has been aroused by the filing of the final account of the administrator of the estate of Willie Skiff, who was murdered by the North Powder in 1888. Evidence at the trial of Bobler, the man suspected of the murder, then proprietor of the North Powder hotel, was to the effect that Skiff met his death on the porch of the hotel and that the body was carried or dragged away. In the following year the supposed body of the murdered man was found in the river not far from the scene of the crime. Bobler lost his mind after the trial.
