EXPORTS MAKE GOOD SHOWING

Portland Ships Large Quantities of Sawmill Products.

WHEAT SHIPMENTS BETTER THAN USUAL

May Is Ordinarily a Dull Month in Shipping but Month Now Closing Proves Marked Exception—Heavy Coastwise Grain Shipments.

Wheat, 484,738 bushels, \$417,287. Flour, 42,125 barrels, \$42,125. Barley, 107,410 bushels, \$10,741. Lumber, 11,949,930 feet, \$43,948. General, 37,361. Total value exports, \$517,322.

For a month so late in the cereal year May exports from Portland make a good showing, wheat, flour, barley, lumber and miscellaneous freight shipped net reaching an aggregate value of \$517,322. The total shows a steady increase in Portland's foreign commercial relations.

This is a dull part of the shipping season, when as a rule little is being done in imports or exports outside of lumber. In that respect, too, the month makes a good showing, with 11,949,930 feet, coastwise lumber shipments reach a total of about half a million feet. Most of the vessels this month carried grain in the hold and lumber for deckload.

CHARLES BARRY. LEAVES PRISON TO END HIS LIFE

Man Who Served Long Term Could Not Agree With Daughter.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Barbara, May 30.—Suicide after 25 years in the penitentiary at San Quentin ended the life of Frank Klesner, who died to death at the home of his daughter 15 minutes after he had gnashed his throat, wrist and thigh with a pocket knife.

Klesner was paroled two months ago after serving a quarter of a century for shooting a man who had trespassed on his ranch in Tuolumne county. He bore an excellent reputation at the prison, but could not get along with his daughter, who was sent to a prison official to take him back to San Quentin.

Before a policeman arrived and Captain Randolph of the San Quentin was on the way to Santa Barbara, Klesner seized a pocket knife and cut several veins, bleeding to death in a few minutes.

RAILS TO NAVIGABLE WATER IN KLAMATH. (Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., May 30.—The California Northeastern railway will be completed to navigable water by midsummer, and there will be no more winter staging into Klamath county.
