An innovation in political campaigns will be introduced Monday by the anti-saloon league when tents will be erected at the 21 polling places of the east side, where the temperance workers will be given hot lunches by the ladies of the east side interested in the success of the war against saloons. The city council has passed an ordinance granting the anti-saloon league the right to use the public grounds to put up these tents. Driscoll was the only councilman who voted no on this ordinance. Only One Thing Governor Has Ever Done, He Thinks, That Is Commendable.

Oregon City, Or., May 29.—Honorable George E. Chamberlain, Salem, Oregon. —My Dear Governor: You ask me "how do you know what the legislature will do?" I do not. Nobody does. But I do know, and everybody knows, that the Republicans who have not likely to vote for you in the legislature. You remember what they did to Governor in 1907. Further, I judge of what the people will do next Monday by what they have done for many years past. Two years ago the Republicans elected 59 representatives and the Democrats one. It was certainly not necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace or safety that the treasurer of Linn county should have his salary raised without your veto, and without any special message. In truth, my dear governor, I believe you are the best of the good politicians who seek office. I do not know of any reform you have ever advocated until it had become so popular with the people that anyone could see it was clearly "good politics" for an office seeker. I should not have entered this controversy, my dear governor, if you and your friends had not taken the position that you were sincere and Mr. Calkins was not; that you had always advocated the progressive legislation of Oregon, wholly for the principle's sake, while Mr. Calkins was a recent convert for the office only. SYMPHONY WILL GIVE LISZT'S ODD MUSIC

The peculiar, electric quality that belongs to all of Liszt's music, firing the emotions of the hearer by its tragic beauty and solemnity and passionate warmth of color, will find expression on two of the three programs at the Armory June 3 and 4, during the New York symphony Orchestra concert season. The symphonic poem, "Les Preludes," which is descriptive of life, love, the struggle with fate, and death, is especially interesting, since it marks a new departure in orchestral music. The symphony as it existed in Beethoven's day is now rare indeed among composers writing for orchestra. Dvorak almost alone clings to it. Liszt, in order to meet the demands of the more popular descriptive music of the day, invented the symphonic poem, which is symphonic in style, but smaller in extent and without any pause between the movements, which are distributed wholly according to the sequence of the emotional moods of the story to be illustrated. Later composers in their symphonic poems have borrowed all attempts at dramatic development shown in the Preludes of Liszt. The impassioned emotional quality of this work gives it much fascination to the lovers of orchestral music. Seats are now selling for these three concerts at Sherman's, and the box office is open from 10 a. m. to 9 p. m. today and next week, including election day.
