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MEASURES SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE JUNE ELECTION 1908

INFORMATION FOR VOTERS

While the objects for which the Taxpayers' league of Portland was organized are limited in their scope, the objects of the amendments to the constitution and laws which have been proposed under the initiative and laws on which the referendum has been invoked and which are to be submitted to the people at the election tomorrow come properly within its jurisdiction.

An amendment to Article VII of the Constitution by increasing the number of judges of the Supreme Court from four to five, until otherwise provided by law, and authorizing the Legislative Assembly to provide by appropriate legislation for the exercise by the circuit courts of the probate jurisdiction theretofore exercised by the county courts, and for the transaction of county business by and before some appropriate body or tribunal.

The foregoing title succinctly states the purpose of this amendment. It is to increase the number of judges of the Supreme Court to five, until changed by law; to place the probate jurisdiction in circuit courts, and to leave to the county courts primarily the conduct of county business.

The change proposed will make one election less every four years and reduce the expense every presidential year by having the election for state officers held at the same time as for presidential elections.

There is no reason why a railroad or other common carrier should grant free transportation to office holders, and in our opinion the only way to prevent the railroads, and to place them under obligations which should not exist.

An act to appropriate \$25,000 annually for four years to be used in purchasing grounds and building armories for the use of the Oregon National Guard, the money to be expended under the supervision of the State Military Board at any time during the four years.

Under this law no definite number of armories, nor the cost of each, are provided for. They may be erected upon the recommendation of the State Military Board in towns where no other companies of the Oregon National Guard are located.

This amendment is revolutionary in the extreme. Its purpose is to cast upon real estate substantially all the burden of taxation and would completely change the present system heretofore in effect in this state.

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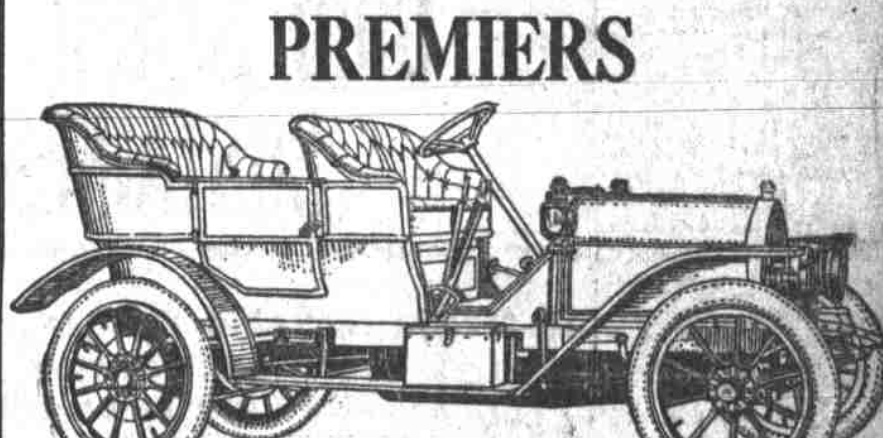

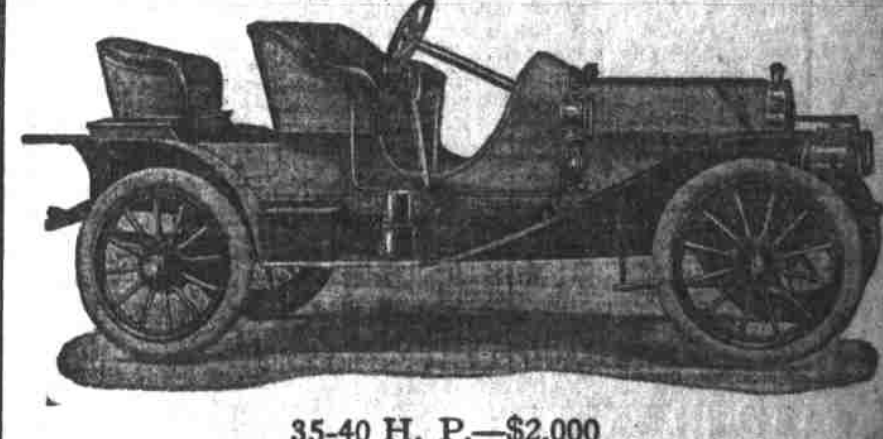
