Oregon Boy Going Close to 25 Feet in the Broad Jump.

By Manhattan. New York, June 1.—We soon will know pretty well who will constitute the eastern contingent of the American Olympic team.

It will naturally be the case when many are called but few are chosen, for he is said in sorrow that the response to the call for contributions to finance the American team has not been as generous as has been hoped, so that in its selections the committee will be pretty certain point winners, cutting out the underdogs and emergency men to a very large extent.

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BOATS COLLIDE; TWO ARE HURT

Government Tug Run Into by Ferry as Former Tried to Land.

Vallejo, Cal., June 1.—Miss Margaret Rysenauer of Denver and Charles Peters, a sailor, are suffering from internal injuries as the result of a collision between the ferry boat El Capitán and the government tug Dart at the government pier.

The tug was trying to land when the crash occurred. Miss Rysenauer was sitting in the stern of the boat when her sister Rita, who was realizing that a collision could not be averted, lay down on the deck behind the guard rail.

Miss Rysenauer sustained internal injuries. Peters was more seriously hurt, as two of his ribs and left wrist was broken; his head was cut open and he was injured internally.
