Steamer Breakwater Arrives Several Hours Late From Coos Bay.

STRONG CURRENT ALONG THE COAST

Captain Macginn's the Sailor Poet, Shakes Hands With Joaquin Miller, Poet of the Sierras, at "Minneapolis Day" Banquet.

Captain Macginn of the steamer Breakwater reports an unusually strong southerly current along the coast this morning.

The Breakwater arrived here at 7 o'clock last night, about four hours later than usual.

While at Coos Bay the officers of the Breakwater were entertained at a banquet given by the Commercial club in honor of "Minnesota day."

Coos Bay is having quite a celebration and the torpedo boat destroyer Perry, which is scheduled to arrive here any day, was at Emporia city when the Breakwater left the bay.

The Breakwater brought 96 passengers and 300 tons of freight.

TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS. Dock Agents Requested to Keep the Crowds Quiet and Orderly.

Every precaution will be taken to prevent accidents in and around the harbor during the Rose Carnival and the visit of the fleet.

Owing to the heavy demand for policemen in the up-town districts dock agents along the waterfront have been empowered to preserve the peace if necessary.

Harbormaster Speier was at the foot of Stark street yesterday and ordered boats carrying passengers for hire to keep away from the float which was placed in condition principally for the benefit of the warship boats.

Launch operators hauled in a rich harvest of small fish yesterday afternoon carrying people to and from the wharves and for a while the Stark street slip was black with people.
