SHOOTS WOMAN; KILLS HIMSELF

Tacoma Millman Wrecks Fearful Vengeance in Rooming House.

Tacoma, June 2.—Seated in a rocking chair near the bed upon which lay the woman he claimed as his sister, Mrs. Harriet Cole, in the Arcade hotel, Frank B. Kelsey last night fired two shots at her, then placed the weapon to his own temple and fired. He died almost instantly. One of the bullets entered Mrs. Cole's left side near the heart, the second striking her in the left cheek. The woman was hurried to St. James' hospital, where it is thought she has a fair chance of recovery. Mrs. Cole is the wife of Bert Cole, who is suing her for divorce. They have two little boys who are under the care of the father. Mrs. Cole is 28 years old, and Kelsey was 34. He had been employed at Everett as a millhand. Mrs. Cole is a waitress employed at a French restaurant. The woman told her room mate and the proprietor of the hotel that Kelsey was her brother.

ADMIRAL MOORE TELLS HIS STORY

Salvadoran Constitution Did Not Permit Him to Flog Sailor.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, June 2.—How he was reduced from the rank of admiral in the Salvadoran navy to a prisoner in jail is told today by Captain Wentworth H. Moore, who returned to this city last night on the Pacific Mail liner Acapulco. Moore went to Salvador six months ago to take charge of the navy, which consists of one little gunboat. He was formerly a first officer in the Pacific Mail service. Acting under orders to make up the navy of the sleeping Central American republic, Moore proceeded to enforce discipline in the American way aboard his flagship. This did not suit the constitutional makeup of his men, and instigators were put to work to have him ousted. An opportunity came when he flogged a sailor on his vessel. This is against the law of Salvador, and he was thrown into jail, where he languished for some time.

TACOMA MAYOR AND FIRE CHIEF AT WAR

Tacoma, Wash., June 2.—By a vote of nine to seven the city council last night refused to dismiss Fire Chief McAlevy, against whom Mayor Sinek had filed charges of incompetence and drunkenness. McAlevy is working under civil service but is a Democrat appointed by the Wright administration. Fourteen of the sixteen councilmen are Republicans and the refusal to eject McAlevy produced a rumpus between the mayor and the Republican leaders in the council.

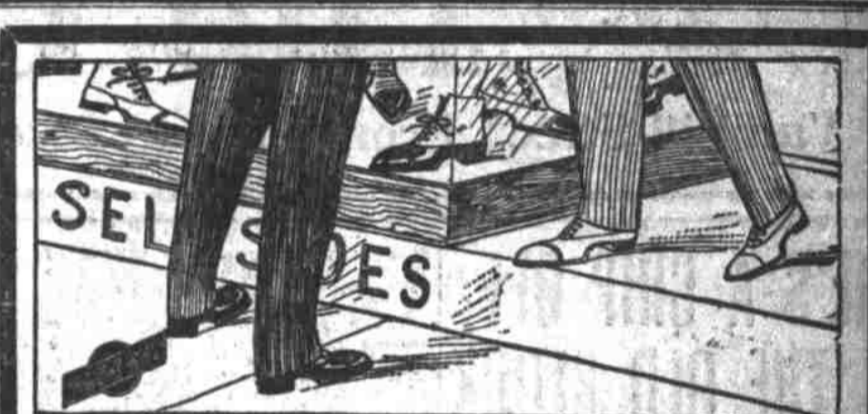
SHREWD GUARD TRAILS CONVICT

Follows Hunch and Has His Man Back in Pen in No Time.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Tacoma, Wash., June 2.—Adam Aren, a convict serving a two years' term in the McNeil's island federal penitentiary for forgery, escaped from that institution shortly before noon yesterday and was recaptured at 6:15 last evening. His quick capture is due to Prison Guard Alton E. Smith, who in trading him to his hiding place in the brush accomplished an exceedingly clever piece of detective work. Aren and four other convicts in charge of Guard Murray Patterson were sent outside of the prison yards yesterday morning to dig a ditch. The men were struck for some distance along the ditch, giving Aren ample opportunity to sneak into the woods nearby. As soon as his absence was noted Patterson took the remaining four convicts back to the penitentiary and the alarm was given and a hot chase started. The United States marshal's office here was notified and in the afternoon Deputy Marshal Ira Davison and Joseph Statter left with a party of special deputies for the island. A launch patrol was also established around the island to prevent Aren's escape to the mainland.
