FITZSIMMONS IS PORTLAND GUEST Famous Fighter Visits Rose City Before Engagement —Would Meet Ketchel.

'I'm the middleweight champion of the world and Stanley Ketchel will have to whip me before he can claim the title. I shall start reducing flesh this week and within the next week or so will get in communication with Ketchel's manager looking toward a fight after my theatrical engagement has closed.'

Fitz is looking well and he says he never felt better. His carriage is 48 years (tomorrow is his birthday) as if they were something to be considered lightly. Yes, tomorrow is his natal day, the famous pugilist having been born in Helston, Cornwall, England, June 4, 1882.

'You see, Mrs. Fitzsimmons and I came on ahead of time from California. Our engagement doesn't start until next Monday night, but we thought we would make in the Rose City during the layoff. We are doing a society skit for the Pantages circuit, entitled 'A Man for a That.' It is a great hit and we had crowded houses in all our theatres. Mrs. Fitzsimmons, whose stage name is Julia May Gifford, includes several songs in her portion of the playlet, while I give an exhibition of bag punching.'

'Remember Jack Dempsey. Portland has grown wonderfully since I was here last. Jim Jeffries and I were here together in vaudeville several years ago. I have always a tender spot for Portland, and it was the home of my old friend Jack Dempsey, the greatest fighter that ever donned the gloves. Dempsey was a man, a man, a man, and the greatest fighter that ever lived.'

'There has been a general impression here in the northwest that I was much heavier than Jack, when we met in New Orleans, January 14, 1901, in that 15-round affair. We both weighed each other in the ring today. Perhaps Jack will not put Bat away in the 15 rounds that he claims, but he will do it surely before the mill has ended.'

'Yes, I think that Burps deserves a lot of credit for what he has done to the English fighters. He has won some money and that is something a lot of American fighters have not done. Do I think he can lick Johnson, the big negro. Here is what I really think.'

Johnson can lick three like Burns in the same night. There is no use suggesting a match between Johnson and Jeffries because Jeff will not fight any more. I never saw Paddy McFarland fight so I can't give you an opinion of him. He has a good record, however.

'But I will fight anybody in the world, middle, light heavy, or heavy. Just now I am anxious to meet this young fellow Ketchel. I will fight him any distance, but I don't imagine he will last longer than four rounds.'

Julia May Gifford, Fitz's wife, is one of the best-known singers on the American stage. She was one of the originals in 'When Johnny Comes Marching Home,' and just previous to her marriage with Bob was closing a three years' contract with Schumann Heink to sing soprano roles with the great prima donna. She is noted for her beauty and voice. They will remain at the Portland during their local engagement.

BEN STANTON SHOTS GOODE

Maddened When Forbidden Interview With His Old Sweetheart.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., June 2.—Councilman J. F. Goode was shot three times last night and painfully but not fatally wounded by Ben Stanton, 22 years old, who had become infatuated with Mrs. Jesse Bees of Peppiner, a granddaughter of Mr. Goode. Stanton had followed Mrs. Bees to the Goode home, on Commercial street, and demanded to see her. Mr. Goode had stepped into the vestibule of the G. A. R. hall next door to telephone for the police, and Stanton ran into the vestibule and shot down the aged man as he stood at the phone.

One of the men who passed Goode's mouth, another grasped his shoulder, and the third was imbedded in the abdominal wall. Mrs. Bees, who has been married but a short time, came to Salem last Saturday from Peppiner to visit relatives. When she and Stanton were children together in Salem Stanton fell in love with her, and when she left Salem he said he would kill her if she married anyone but him. It is supposed Stanton came to the Goode home last night with the intention of killing Mrs. Bees or making some preposterous demand.

Deputies Eech and Minto, the latter now sheriff-elect, took Stanton into custody at about 11 here. He was arrested at 5 o'clock this morning. Stanton was sleeping face downward on a couch, with his loaded revolver clasped in his hand ready to fight before he would be taken. Stanton's family is well respected in Salem, and rather than make any more complications the brother consented to the sheriff's taking the boy while sleeping. The would-be murderer had been drinking, but was not drunk when he made his appearance at the Goode home. The revolver was a .38-caliber Smith & Wesson and had been taken by Stanton from the Wells-Fargo express office in this city, where a brother of Stanton is employed. Stanton had been working today at the home of his brother, a butcher, but was let out yesterday afternoon.

Stanton had been despondent. It is said, since the death of his mother about two months ago. J. F. Goode, the victim of the assault, is the father of Miss Lulu Goode and Jack Goode, who figured recently in the horsewhipping of Elder W. N. Coffey of Portland, Free Methodist minister.
