HOLDS MACHINE IS RESPONSIBLE

Colonel Hofer Declares Election Shows the Revolt in Voters' Minds.

Colonel E. Hofer, the anti-machine Republican leader of the western Oregon counties, who supported Calkins loyally and has been an ardent champion of Statement No. 1, does not regard the defeat of the Republican candidate as due to the direct primary law, but as an overwhelming rebuke to the machine politics in the councils of the Republican party. He is in the city attending the Festival of Roses.

"If anything were needed to defeat the old machine managers, the action of the state Republican convention in putting only its shell-worn materials in the political show windows was enough to defeat Calkins," he declared. "It insulted the reform elements in the Republican party by its indirect slaps at Statement No. 1 and the direct primary in its state platform, but not satisfied with that, sent out speakers whose whole campaign consisted in flings at the progressive spirit and principles for which the better class of public men are contending."

"This was done in the name of Republicanism. For instance, Wallace McCamant's arguments in Marion county were apologies for the progressive spirit of the party. There wasn't a single machine campaign speaker who had a word of condemnation for graft and corruption, both of which have been under the noses of the Oregon people for years. The election of Chamberlain was a victory for a man who as a state official has fought graft and accomplished things for the public good, a matter which no Republican leader has accomplished in the past 20 years. But the people are demanding just the kind of things Chamberlain stands for and his election in consequence is far reaching. The rank and file of the Republican party do not approve of the machine crowd's apologies for corruption and the things which have disgraced Oregon for years. These are conditions which must be stamped out and if a Republican who is opposed to graft and corruption is not put up, then the Republicans are going to vote for a Democrat."

COMPLAIN OF STRONG PACKING-HOUSE ODORS

Five property-owners residing in the vicinity of the plants of the Zimmerman Packing company and the Schwartzschild & Sulzburger company have filed a petition in the circuit court asking for an injunction to restrain noxious odors that are said to come from the packing plants. It is alleged that the fumes coming from the slaughter establishments and rendering vats are too strong for the peace of the neighborhood. It is charged that the smell invades the homes of the complainants and cuts a wide swath in the atmosphere for blocks around.

The plaintiffs in the case are J. M. Parks, W. R. Walpole, E. A. Sessions, Ernest Kroper and C. W. Cottel. They reside on Kelly and Curry streets and Bancroft avenue, near the Terwilliger tract. They ask the court to have the smell abated as a nuisance, declaring that their property is depreciated in value by the proximity of the odor-makers.
