

TAFT MAY NOT GET THE NOMINATION

Favorite Son Boomers Believe War Secretary Can Be Beaten on Issue of His Remarkable Memorial Day Address at Grant's Tomb.

Members of G. A. R. All Over Country Indignant—Story Going Rounds at National Headquarters That Roosevelt Will Be Nominee.

Chicago, June 3.—A sudden lift has been injected into the presidential boom of all the favorite sons by the belief that Secretary Taft can be beaten on the issue of his remarkable Memorial day address at Grant's tomb, in which he referred to General Grant's drunkenness.

The fight is on today in a dozen different quarters and plans are being laid to win the nomination away from the secretary of war who only last week was looked upon as certain of success.

All against Taft. News comes from Indianapolis this morning that an effort is being made there to form an alliance of candidates against Taft.

Frank H. Hitchcock, Secretary Taft's manager, sees trouble ahead. He left Washington hurriedly and arrived here today to take charge of the headquarters and direct the fight.

Speaker Joseph G. Cannon, who was on his way home in a touring car, suddenly abandoned it and took a limited train for Illinois.

Senator Hendaway of Indiana, who has charge of the Fairbanks campaign, also was in the automobile, and he, too, left it upon arriving here at Indianapolis where he will hold a consultation with Fairbanks and then will come here at once.

The Hughes boomers and the Knox managers also are using every means of making the most of the peculiar situation.

Candidates All Hopeful. All candidates have new hopes and interest in the campaign has more than doubled in the last 24 hours.

Some of the Fairbanks supporters today said: "The remarks made by Taft at Grant's tomb were mentioned at every opportunity upon the floor of the convention. It was the most damaging statement that a presidential candidate ever made, so far as I know, just before a national convention, too, when he seemed sure of nomination."

Members of the G. A. R. all over the country are indignant that Taft saw fit to drag up the only thing that was ever said to the discredit of General Grant and take occasion to refer to it at a Memorial day exercise—and at Grant's own sacred tomb! It was such a display of bad judgment that it will weaken the confidence of all people in him. This thing is going to be used against Taft and it will beat him if we can make it. There is no way to hush it up now."

Second Termers at Work. A story that is thick in the air about national headquarters is that Roosevelt will be nominated if it appears that Taft has been defeated. Despite Roosevelt's repeated statements that he would not accept a renomination, the "second elective term" howlers are busy at work. They said that Roosevelt wants his policies continued more than he wants anything else in the world and that if Taft cannot be nominated the president surely will be.

In the light of developments of the last 24 hours the managers of the various campaigns are watching each other closely and an anti-Taft alliance may be formed.

JOURNAL WON THE FIGHT

Governor Chamberlain Attributes Victory in Recent Election Due to Magnificent Fight for People's Rights Carried on by This Paper.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Salem, Or., June 3.—"The victory which has been accomplished," said Governor George E. Chamberlain this morning, "is principally due to the magnificent fight which The Journal has made in behalf of Statement No. 1 and the right of the people to name the man whom they desire to have represent them in the senate of the United States. The people of the state are determined not to relinquish this power they have achieved under the provisions of the direct primary nominating law."

"A failure to carry out the wishes of the people by any member of the legislature would mean a permanent stain upon the subject and they will not permit any dodging of the issue. The causes which led to the defeat of Mr. Calkins are clearly signified by the election of a large number of Statement No. 1 legislators. I believe if Mr. Calkins had insisted after his nomination upon the election of members of the legislature who had subscribed to Statement No. 1, he would have won at the general election. In his campaign before the primaries he advocated Statement No. 1 and the nomination and election to the legislature of only those who had subscribed to Statement No. 1."

COMPLETE RETURNS IN LINN COUNTY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., June 3.—Complete but unofficial returns in Linn county give Hawley 2,811, Whitney 1,650, Calkins 1,352, Chamberlain 2,369. Legislative ticket: Democratic—Branton 1,934, Munkers 2,209, Philpott 2,219. Republican—Brown 1,939, Porter 936. C. L. Meyer 1,717. This indicates the election of two Democrats and one Republican, all pledged to Statement No. 1. Brown, Republican, leads Porter, his nearest opponent, by the small margin of four votes, and the official count may change this year the returns are generally reliable. Linn county is jubilant over Chamberlain's election and plans a celebration.
