

ASSASSIN FIRES POINT BLANK AT DREYFUS

M. GREGORI, EDITOR, HIS ASSAILANT

Mob Overtakes Gendarmes in Charge of Prisoner and Fight Follows—Paris Is Wildly Excited—Dreyfus Only Slightly Wounded.

Two Bullets Enter Arm—Ambassador White and United Press Representative Present When Shooting Occurred.

Paris, June 4.—M. Gregori, military editor of La Gaulois, who had been standing by my side for several minutes today, suddenly quitted the crowd of newspaper men with whom I was, walked directly up to Major Alfred Dreyfus and fired point blank at him twice with a revolver.

Both balls took effect in the right arm of the man whose name spread around the world when he was exiled for a treason charge afterward disproved.

Dreyfus Uttered No Cry. Major Dreyfus, though surprised by the sudden attack, uttered no cry or exclamation of any kind.

Gregori darted into the crowd in an attempt to make a hasty escape, but M. Mouquin, head of the municipal police, was near at hand and pounced upon the fleeing editor.

The officer quickly subdued the prisoner, took his pistol and turned him over to a gendarme, who hurried him away to jail.

Great Crowds Present. The sensational affair, took place near the close of the exercises in celebration of the transfer of the remains of Emile Zola, the famous novelist and defender of Dreyfus, from Mont Martre cemetery to the Pantheon, the French Hall of Fame.

Tremendous crowds were present and trouble had been feared in advance because of the feeling revived by the remembrance of the Dreyfus case by which France was torn asunder.

Dreyfus Rushed Home. After the shooting Dreyfus displayed the most remarkable presence of mind. He begged the people about him to be quiet and not to let it become generally known what had happened. He then walked unassisted to an automobile, which he entered and was pushed away to his home.

Gregori stood within three feet of President Fallieres. As a patriotic song was being sung, Fallieres, closely followed by Dreyfus and Minister Bourgeois, started down the steps to review the parade.

Coolness Averted Some. As they passed the press table Gregori arose with the others and as Dreyfus approached he exclaimed: "Here's for the parade!" Thereupon he stepped up to Dreyfus and fired. The crowd around Dreyfus and the president alone could have saved

WINS VOTES IN MARION

Unofficial Count Gives Governor a Plurality of 133 Over Calkins—Salem Went Wet by Small Margin; County by 553.

Salem, Or., June 4.—Complete unofficial count in Marion county gives Chamberlain a plurality of 133 votes. The county stands as follows: Calkins, 2,148; Chamberlain, 1,815.

PLEDGE IS SACRED AND MUST HOLD

Prominent Republicans Declare It is the Plain Duty of the State's Legislators to Vote for Chamberlain for Senator.

Henry McGinn, Judge Webster and Others Regard Statement No. 1 as in Agreement Which is Absolutely Binding.

That the duty of the legislators who pledged themselves to Statement No. 1 is to live up to their pledge and vote for Governor George E. Chamberlain for United States senator when the legislature convenes next January is the opinion of leading Republicans of Portland.

Henry E. McGinn, who voted for Calkins, is a firm believer in Statement No. 1 and spoke very pointedly upon the duty of the legislators when it comes to electing a senator. He said: "Pledge to People, McGinn."

"My position is plain. The majority of the legislators are pledged to Statement No. 1, which is a pledge to the people that the legislator will vote for the people's nominee for United States senator irrespective of party affiliations first, last and all the time.

"I believe in Statement No. 1 and despite the fact that I did not vote for Governor Chamberlain, but did vote for H. M. Calkins, I believe it the duty of every legislator pledged to Statement No. 1 to live up to his pledge and vote for Governor Chamberlain. I have confidence in the men elected Monday and believe they will keep their pledge and that Governor Chamberlain will be seated.

"This election has not been an idle ceremony. You will find that the people are firm in their conviction in regard to the election of United States senator by popular vote. They will demand of the legislators that they live up to their pledges."

Lawyer John F. Logan was terse in his statement as to the duty of the legislators when they meet to elect a United States senator. He treated the issue as a personal one between the legislator and the people. He said: "My opinion is that if any man has given his word to do a thing he should do it. If these men who have signed Statement No. 1 break their pledge they could never expect to live in the community afterwards. If a legislator cannot carry out a promise he has made and it does not make any difference whether it is in business or in politics—he should not be allowed to enter politics again, for if he breaks his word on this important question whatever promise he would make in the future could not be relied upon."

"Finally I want to say that I am a Republican but I am staunch and true enough in my principles to believe in Statement No. 1. That is all I care to say but I think it is enough to let anybody know how I stand."

Considered It an Agreement. Judge Lionel R. Webster of the county court is another prominent Republican who expects the legislators (Continued on Page Seven.)
