

WIG CAN VISIT CZAR

Recall and Other Amendments Given Voters' Approval, While Armory Bill Falls—Single Tax and Equal Suffrage Fail.

London, June 4.—After a hot debate in which personalities were freely indulged in, the labor party in the house of commons today lost their fight to prevent King Edward from visiting Reval to pay his respects to Czar Nicholas. The labor party were overwhelmingly defeated by a vote of 225 to 59. When the first announcement was made that the king contemplated a trip to see the czar, the members of the labor party gave notice of their opposition to the plan by bringing the matter up in the house of commons. The king's entire strength was mustered to get a favorable vote, but they failed.

Wait Official Count.

Returns on the constitutional amendments and the referendum and initiative measures are coming in slowly, but will not be possible to know certain results on all of them until the official count is made by the secretary of state. County clerks are making the official count at which time the fate of all the candidates and measures will be definitely known.

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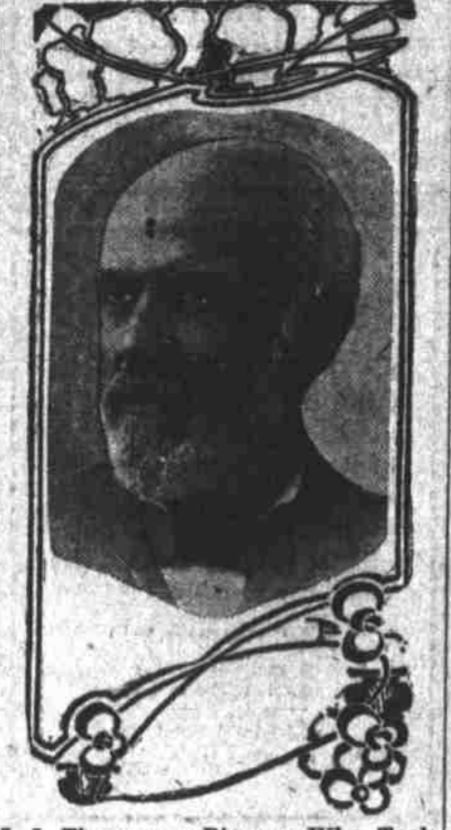
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Pioneer Who Shot Himself

Salem, Or., June 4.—J. I. Thompson, who committed suicide at his home on Oak street by shooting himself with a rifle Wednesday morning, was a pioneer of 1857, having crossed the plains to California in that year. In 1860 he came to Oregon and settled in Polk county, where he was favorably known.

ON GROUND BEFORE ANY PORTLAND HERE

William L. Higgins, Earliest Pioneer, Dies at Age of 86 Years.

William L. Higgins, the oldest pioneer resident of Portland and one of the earliest pioneers in the state, having first come to the Columbia river country in 1843, died at his residence, 508 Broadway, yesterday morning, from causes incident to old age. He was born in Rhode Island in 1822, and was 86 years of age. Portland was not founded until three years after Mr. Higgins first visited this part of Oregon, the only inhabitant being the lower Columbia country at that time being Oregon City, Vancouver, Washington, and Astoria, all of which were Hudson Bay company's stations.
