

# BOYCOTT SPREADS

### Activity of Cantonese Emis-saries in North China and Manchuria Causes Offer of 200,000 Yen if Japanese Boycott Is Stopped.

Tokyo, June 5.—Two hundred thousand yen is now indicated as the size of the proposed present to Canton guilds if the boycott is discontinued. Meanwhile advices from north China and Manchuria state that owing to the activity of the Cantonese emissaries, the movement is rapidly spreading throughout the north.

### JAPANESE RETALIATE.

#### Sons of Nippon in San Francisco Boycott Chinese Quarter.

San Francisco, June 5.—San Francisco's large Chinese quarter is agitated today over a boycott declared by the local Japanese colony on all Chinese restaurants and gambling houses. The measure is taken in retaliation of the Chinese boycott of Japanese goods and is being engineered by a secret committee.

### CANNING SEASON ON AT SOUTH BELLINGHAM

Bellingham, Wash., June 5.—The salmon canning season was opened yesterday by the Pacific American Fisheries in South Bellingham and thousands of wheels, belts and pulleys were set in motion for the first time in many months. Not many fish were canned, but the few that were brought in from the salmon banks were of fine quality. The companies expect from 10 to 30 tons of fish each day until the first of July, when a big run is looked for. When the canning season is at its best six lines of machines will be running.

# SIDETRACK ISSUE MUST BE SETTLED

### State Commission to Make Test Case Against the Southern Pacific.

Salem, Or., June 5.—One of the problems that the state railroad commission must face regards the installation of sidetracks at points where there are manufacturing. An appeal for an adjustment of difficulties, arising out of an application for the installation of an additional sidetrack at Monmouth, has been made to the commission by the Monmouth Canning & Evaporating company and the papers for a hearing were served on the Southern Pacific yesterday.

### BIBLICAL COURSE AT PACIFIC UNIVERSITY

Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., June 5.—A department of Biblical language and literature will be added to the course of study the coming year. The department will have a separateowment of \$40,000, of which \$15,000 has already been obtained. An agent is now at work in the east raising the remaining amount. The income from this endowment will maintain a professorship and also be used for the support of a Bible department in the library. Each summer a three-weeks institute for instruction and raising in practical religious work will be held. This will be designed especially for Sunday school and Christian association workers.
