STANFORD PUTS FEAR INTO EAST BUNCH TO PAPKE

Western College Athletes Meet Cream of East in Chicago Tomorrow.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, June 5.—The cream of the western college athletes is pouring into Chicago to take part in the track games of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic association on Marshall field tomorrow.

The coaches predict a small total for the winning track team this year. The largest number of colleges entered Illinois and Chicago remain apparently the strongest contenders for the honors in the conference game with Stanford a dangerous visitor from the Pacific coast.

The "big eight" authorities will slash into the events in formidable style, and the coast school is conceded a strong chance to win the meet. Nine athletes of more than passing note will carry the Leland colors. The team will be composed of the following: Reed—100 yards, 0:10 1-5; 220 yards, 0:22 2-5.

Wyman—440 yards, 0:51. Miller—880 yards, 1:30 1-5; 440 yards, 0:31 2-5. Maundrell—Two miles, 10:10. Bradford—One mile, 4:33 1-5. Horton—Low hurdles, 0:25 5-5; shot put, 44 feet 6 inches.

Beliah—Pole vault, 12 feet 3/4 inches; broad jump, 22 feet 7/8 inches.

I stated then, and ever since that he deliberately quit under punishment as he has never on such an occasion before, and I am still of the same opinion.
