PROBABLY 4,000

Late Returns Dimish Appropriation Bill's Lead—Result Unchanged.

The University of Oregon appropriation bill is losing its big lead as the returns from the outside counties come in, and though there is no doubt that the bill will ultimately have an affirmative majority of not less than 4,000, yet it is in the hands of possibility that the lead may be cut lower. On the other hand, favorable returns from the missing counties and the completion of the official counts make the total larger than it is at present indicated.

Well-Known Merchant Gets Highest Vote for Any Candidate on the Legislative Ticket—Official Returns Are Made.

Ben Selling, for state senator, received the highest vote of any candidate on the legislative ticket in Multnomah county. The official count shows that he has 19,450 votes, falling only a little behind Justice R. S. Bean, who received both the Republican and Democratic nominations, and is probably high man on the entire ticket, unless some of the unopposed candidates on the county ticket beyond him.

CHAMBERLAIN'S LEAD NOW 1,933 IN STATE

George E. Chamberlain's plurality in the senatorial race continues to increase slowly as the official count progresses all over the state. The completed count in Multnomah shows that he carried this county by 1,067, a gain from previous figures of 78.

CUTS HIS THROAT WITH STOLEN BLADE

Joseph Bell, Aged 60, Ends a Sad and Inglorious Career a Suicide.

Vancouver, Wash., June 6.—Joseph Bell, 60 years of age, whose antecedents are unknown, committed suicide at 11:45 today at the Union lodging-house, on lower Main street, by cutting his throat from ear to ear with a razor which he had abstracted from a barber shop here. Bell came here two weeks ago and applied to the county commissioner for admission into the Clarke county poorhouse, but the commissioners sent him back to Portland, whence he had just come. He returned here yesterday. He remarked to an acquaintance yesterday afternoon that today he would kill himself, on the 20th anniversary of his wedding.

COMEDIAN HITCHCOCK IS COMPLETE WRECK

New York, June 6.—Raymond Hitchcock, famous as the star comedian in the Yankovs, made his debut in the library of the Tombs prison this afternoon for a conference with his lawyers, looking like a shadow of his former self. The body which is on trial for alleged mistreatment of Helen of Hagan, a 14-year-old girl, is a complete wreck. His hair was unbrushed, his clothes not neatly arranged and his nerve seemed to be completely gone. Deep hollows in his face and heavy lines show that his night in prison had a terrible effect on him. There was the faintest shadow of his old-time smile, which has grinned at the public from billboards in every corner of the country, when he said: "This is about the poorest piece I have ever starred in. I hope the engagement will be short."

YORKTOWN ORDERED TO PATROL BEHRING SEA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 6.—Plans were perfected today to send the gunboat Yorktown to Behring sea this summer to patrol the salmon fishing grounds. The gunboat will be present in case she is needed to enforce the law against the fishermen that have created excitement in the fisheries during the past year. The Yorktown will leave Puget sound June 18 and spend the entire fishing season in the vicinity of Pibloff islands.

Rev. Green C. Love Sues the Editor of Mount Scott News.

Sizzling repartee and verbal brickbats that appeared in the columns of the Mount Scott News during the recent annexation campaign are being aired in department No. 1 of the circuit court today in the trial of the libel suit of Rev. Green C. Love of Nashville against A. W. Miller of Woodmere. Love claims that his reputation was damaged to the extent of \$200 by articles referring to him as a "holy drone," a "parasite," a "sycophant," and other words with which he was belabored.

Mr. Love, who described himself on the witness-stand as a "minister of the gospel of spiritism," did a little "roasting" of Miller in response to the slights that appeared in the Mount Scott paper. In one communication he referred frequently to "Unlucky Miller," and casually remarks: "I am willing to say that I inherited a disposition to tell the truth. If Miller inherited that disposition, his letter indicates that he lost his inheritance."

Miller was equal to the occasion. He came back and calmly expressed doubt as to how he would face the accusation of libel, but he denies that any libel was committed. In one of Love's letters allusion was made to a trip in the east, and this is Miller's spirited response: "He refers to his trip east, saying that he did not travel as he expressed approval of somebody smoking at one of the annexation meetings."

BIGAMIST WILDE GETS SEVEN YEARS
